2019 AAU Survey – Key Facts

- The survey was administered on Stanford campus by Westat from **April 9, 2019 to May 10, 2019**
 - All participating AAU schools administered the survey between February and May of 2019
 - **62% Stanford response rate – 10,098 students completed the survey**
 - 63% (4,536) Stanford undergraduate response rate
 - 61% (5,562) Stanford graduate/professional response rate
 - **22% - AAU 33 school average** response rate
 - **31% - AAU private school** response rate
 - Commonly referenced peer institutions: 32%-45%

2019 AAU Survey Report – Gender Identity Reporting

In the 2019 Westat AAU survey report and survey data provided to Stanford:

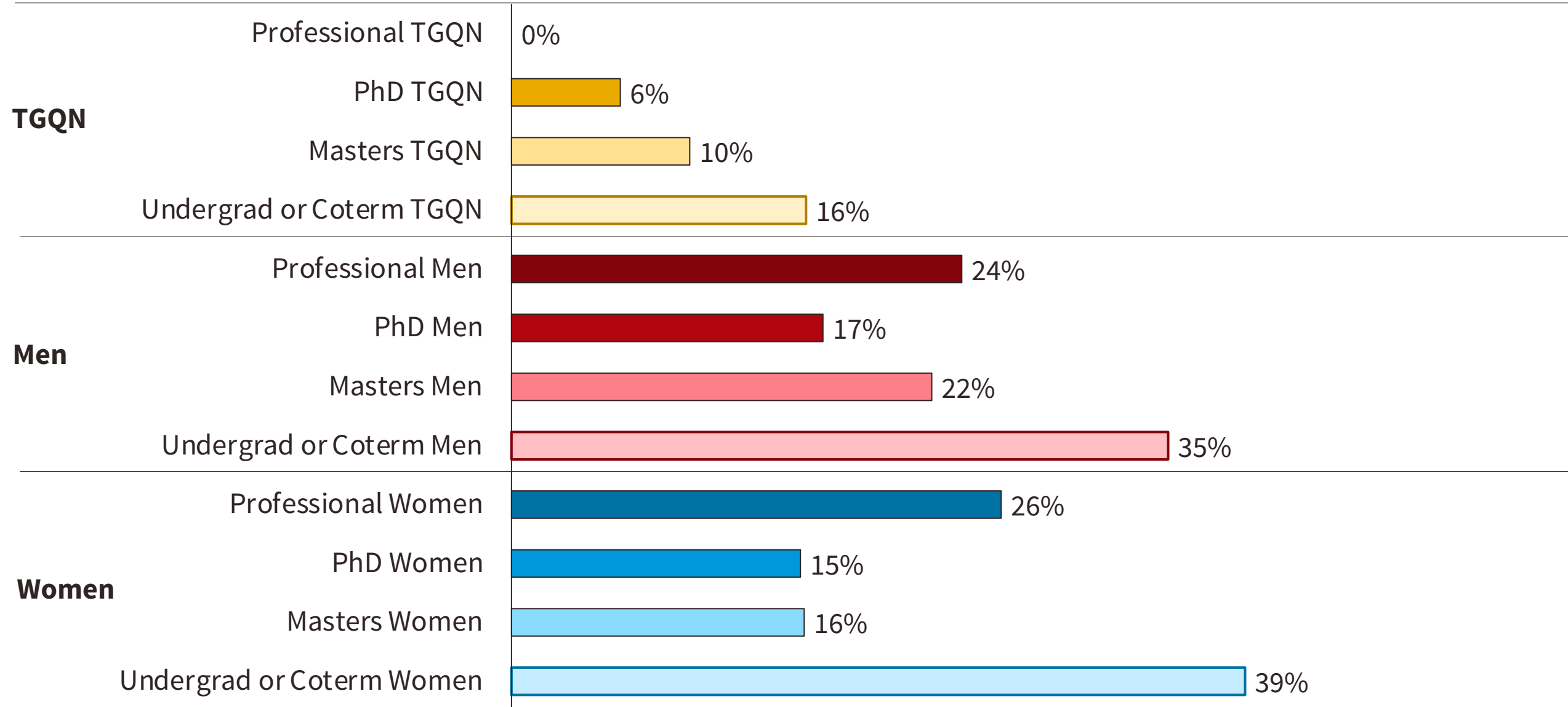
- **“TGQN, TGQN students, and TGQN respondents...** are used interchangeably and denote students who listed their gender identity as one of the following categories:
 - Transgender woman,
 - Transgender man,
 - Nonbinary/genderqueer,
 - Gender questioning, or
 - Gender not listed”
- In the October Stanford campus report, Westat **aggregated TGQN undergraduate and graduate/professional students.**
- **These new June 2020 Stanford findings disaggregate the TGQN population by degree.**
- **1.8% (182)** of Stanford survey respondents indicated a gender identity other than “man” or “woman” or did not select a gender identity and were grouped by Westat into the TGQN gender identity category. For many questions on the survey, there were enough students in this category in Stanford survey data to disaggregate the population by degree without risk to student privacy.

All students by degree and gender– Percent **Very or Extremely**



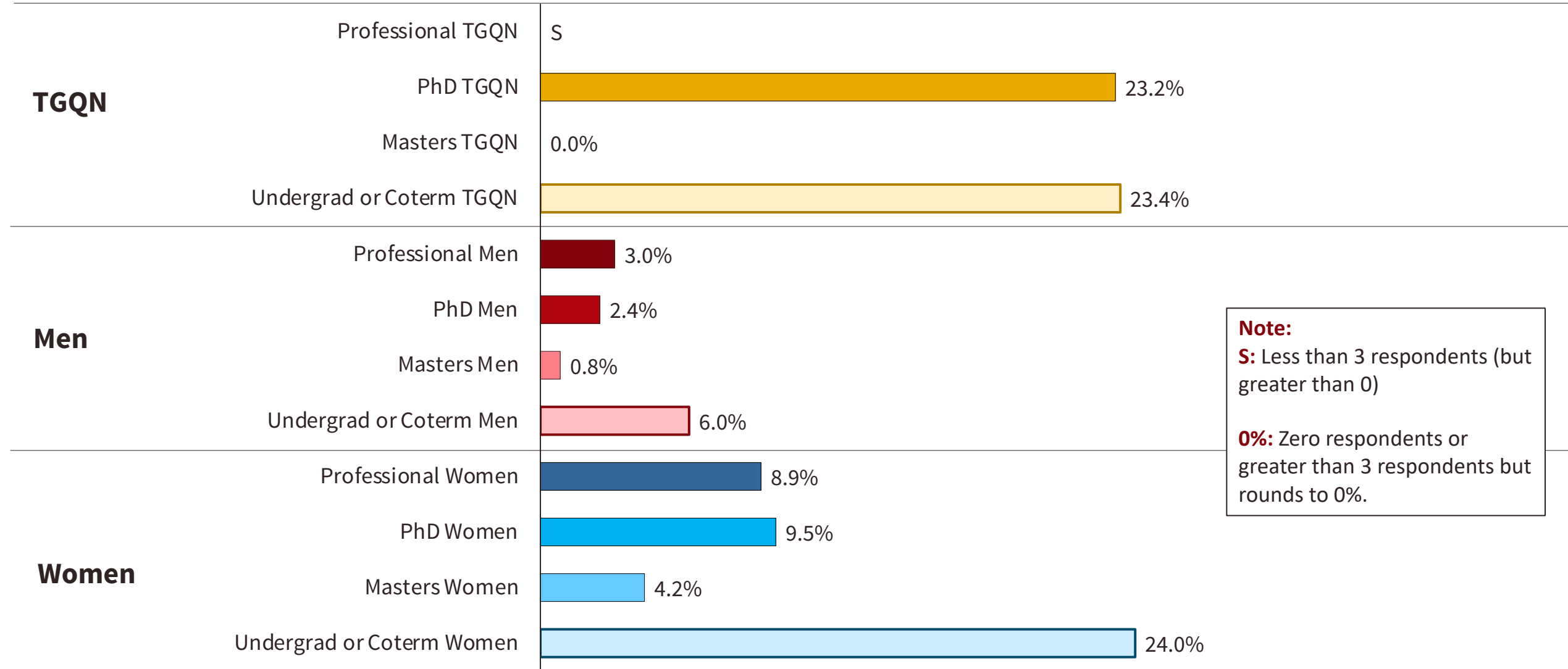

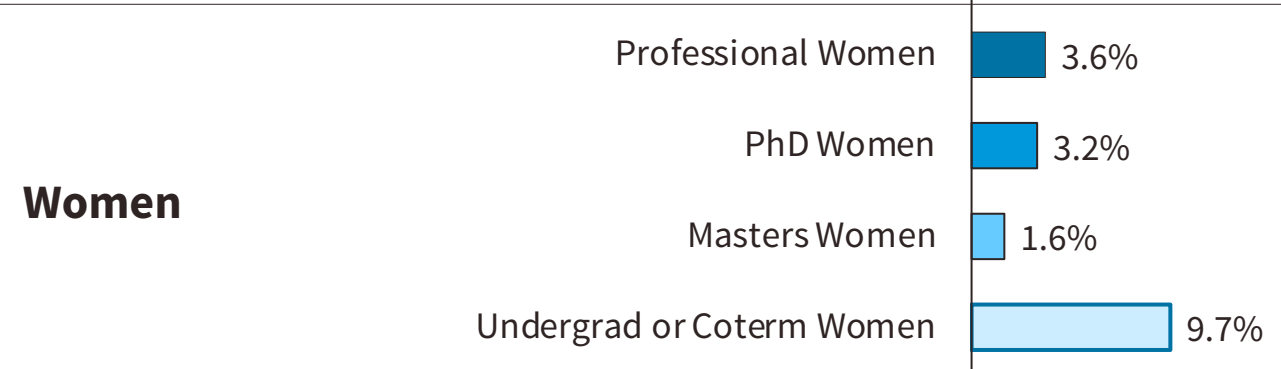

by **physical force or inability to consent** since entering Stanford**

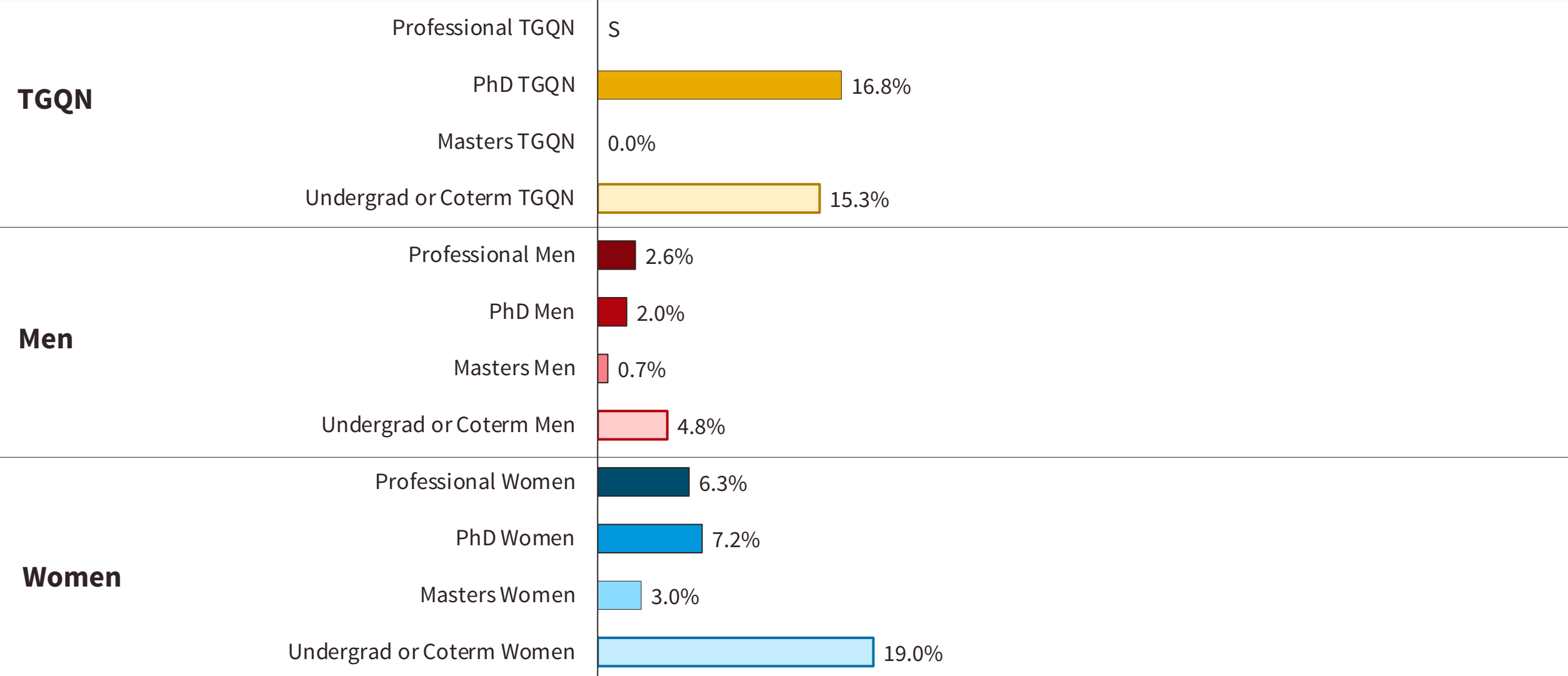

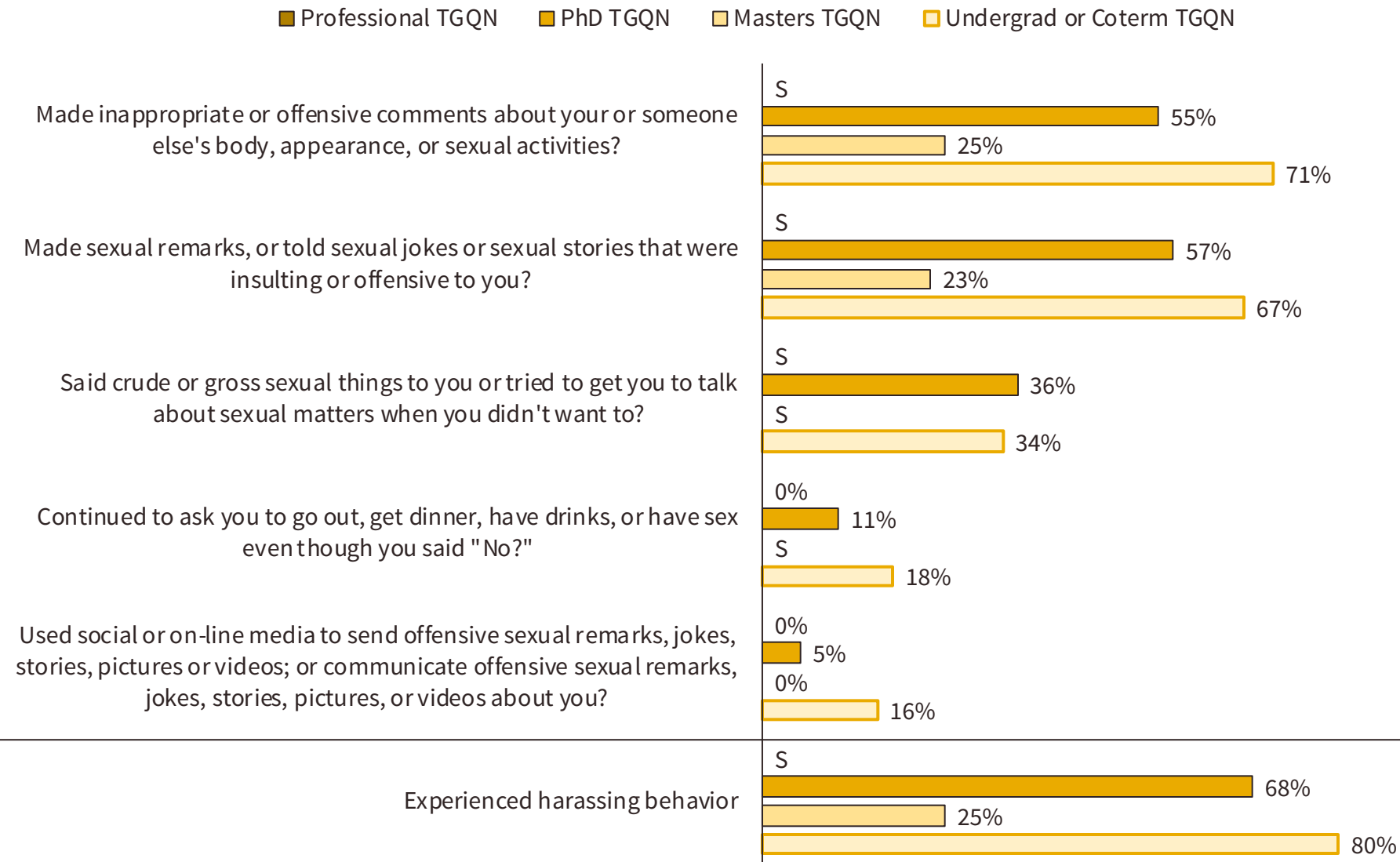

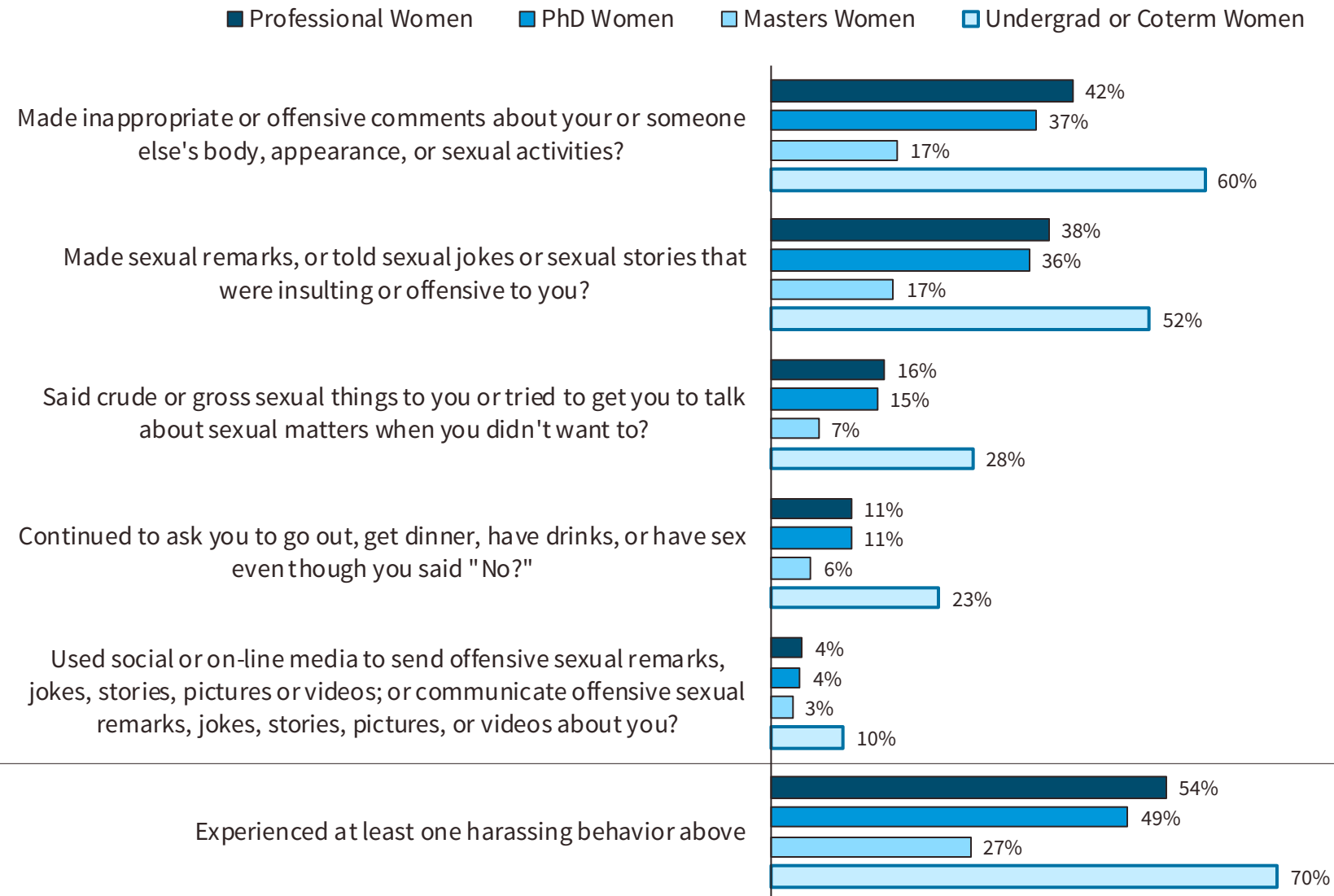

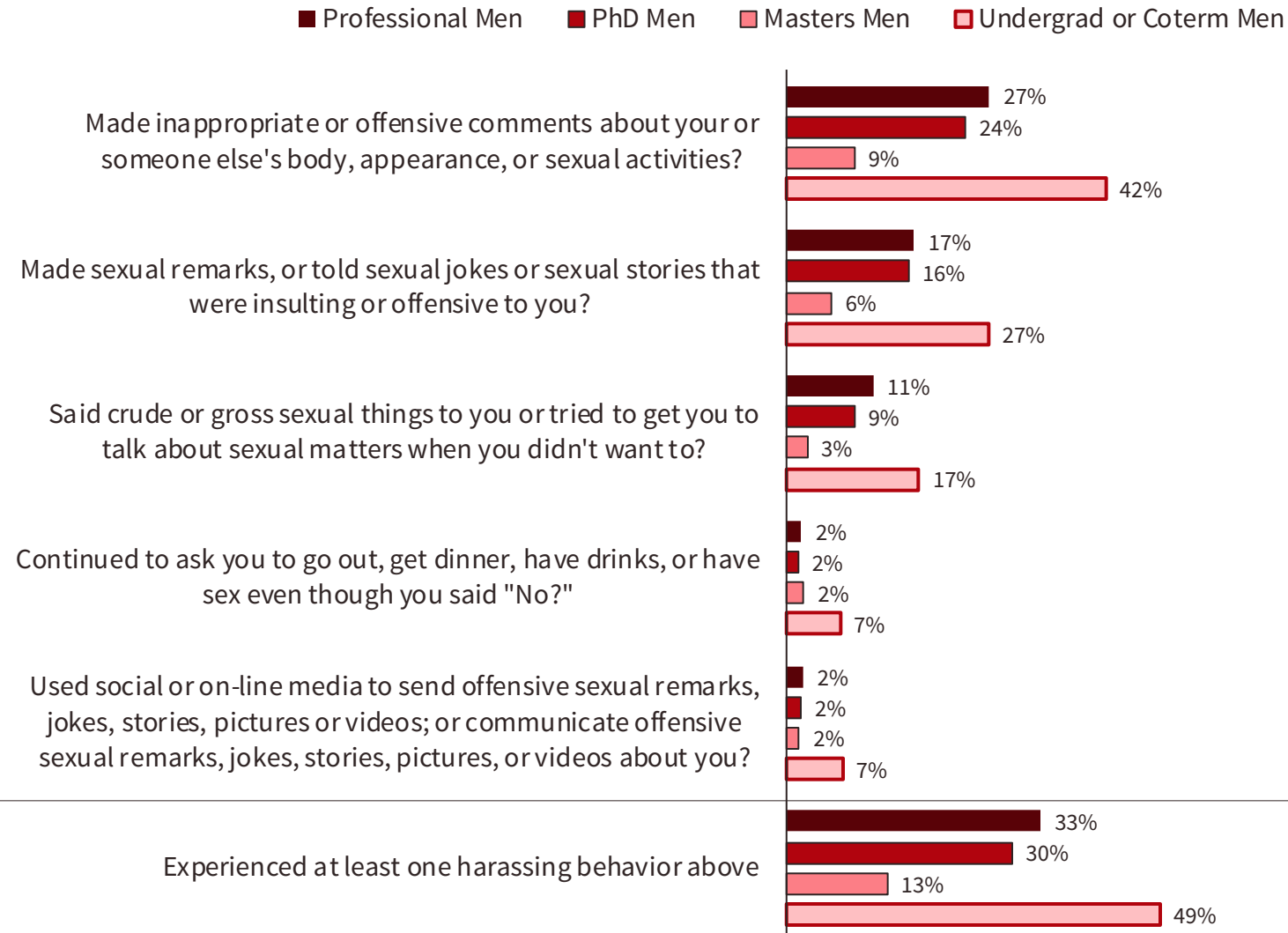

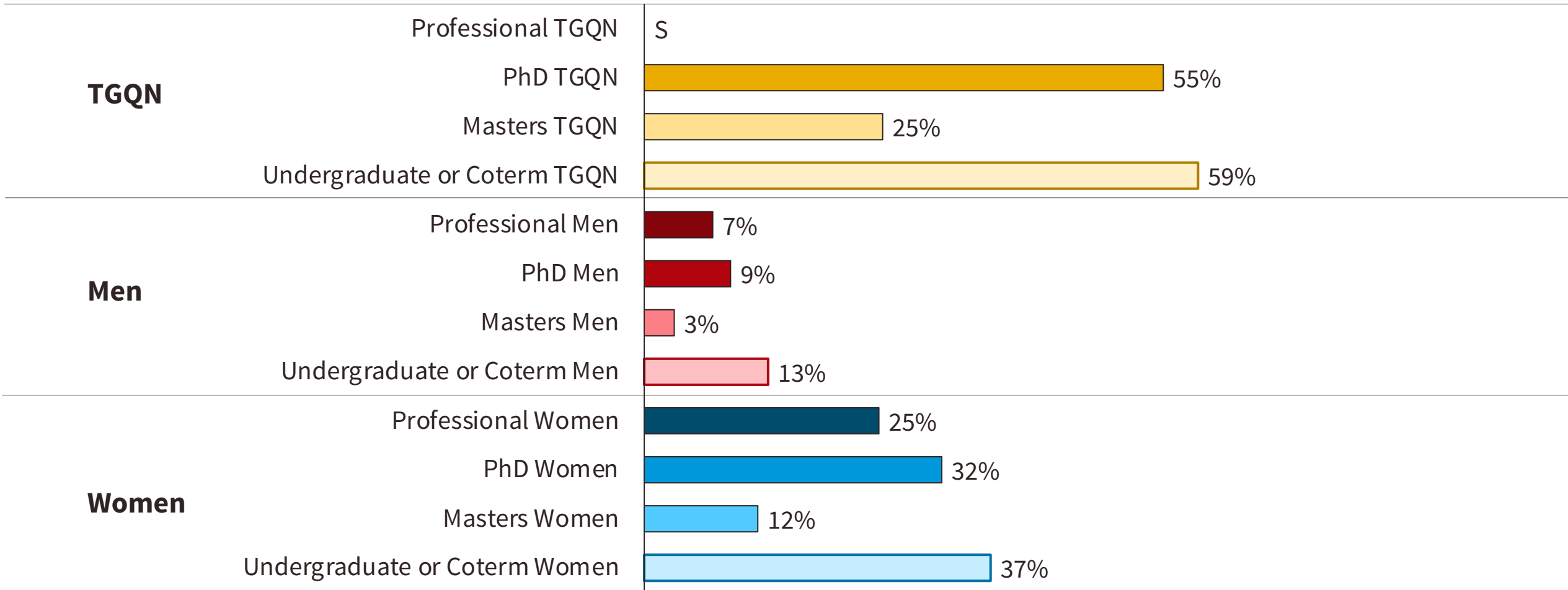

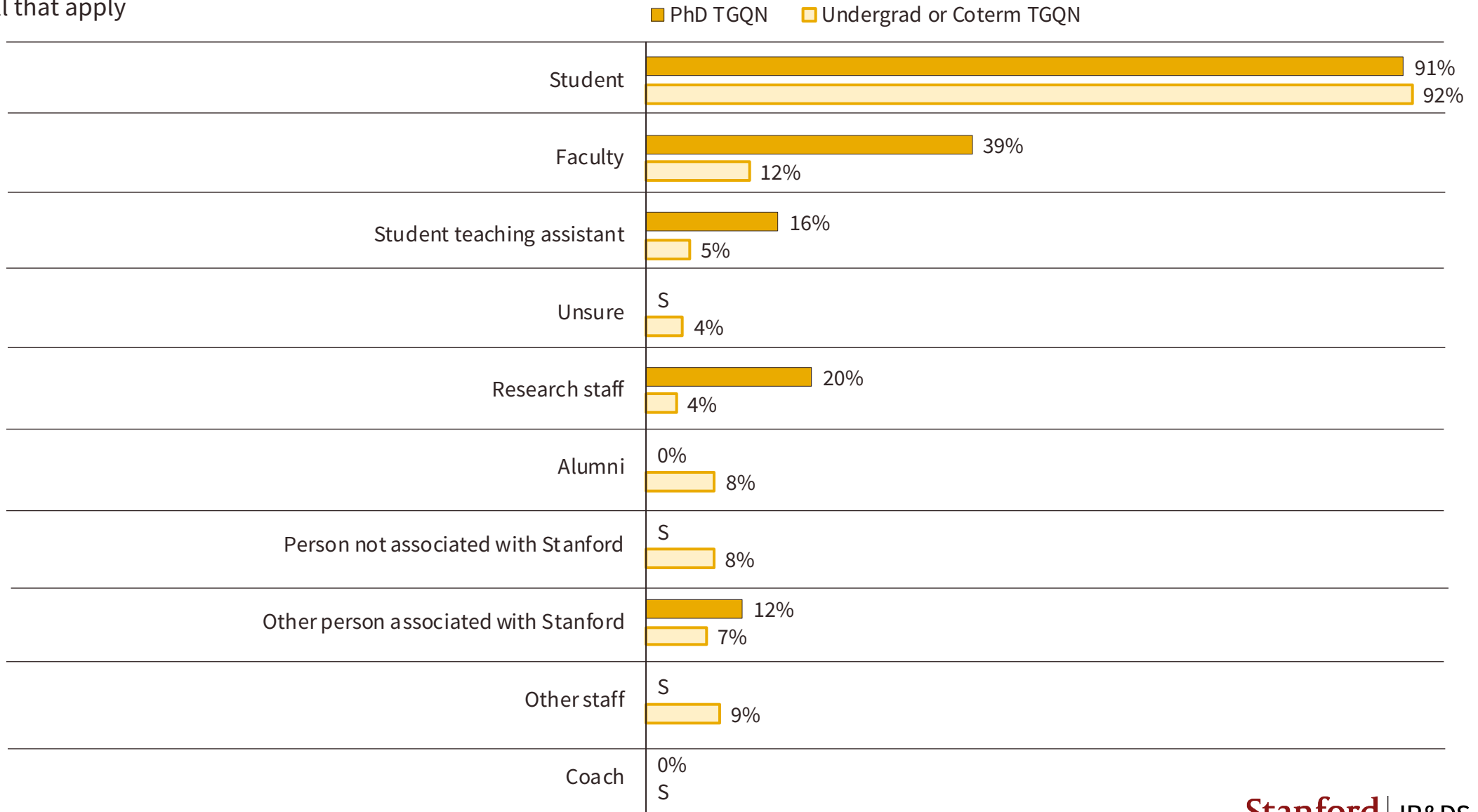

How was the person/were the persons **who did this to you associated** with Stanford? Percent of TGQN* students by degree who experienced at least one harassing behavior

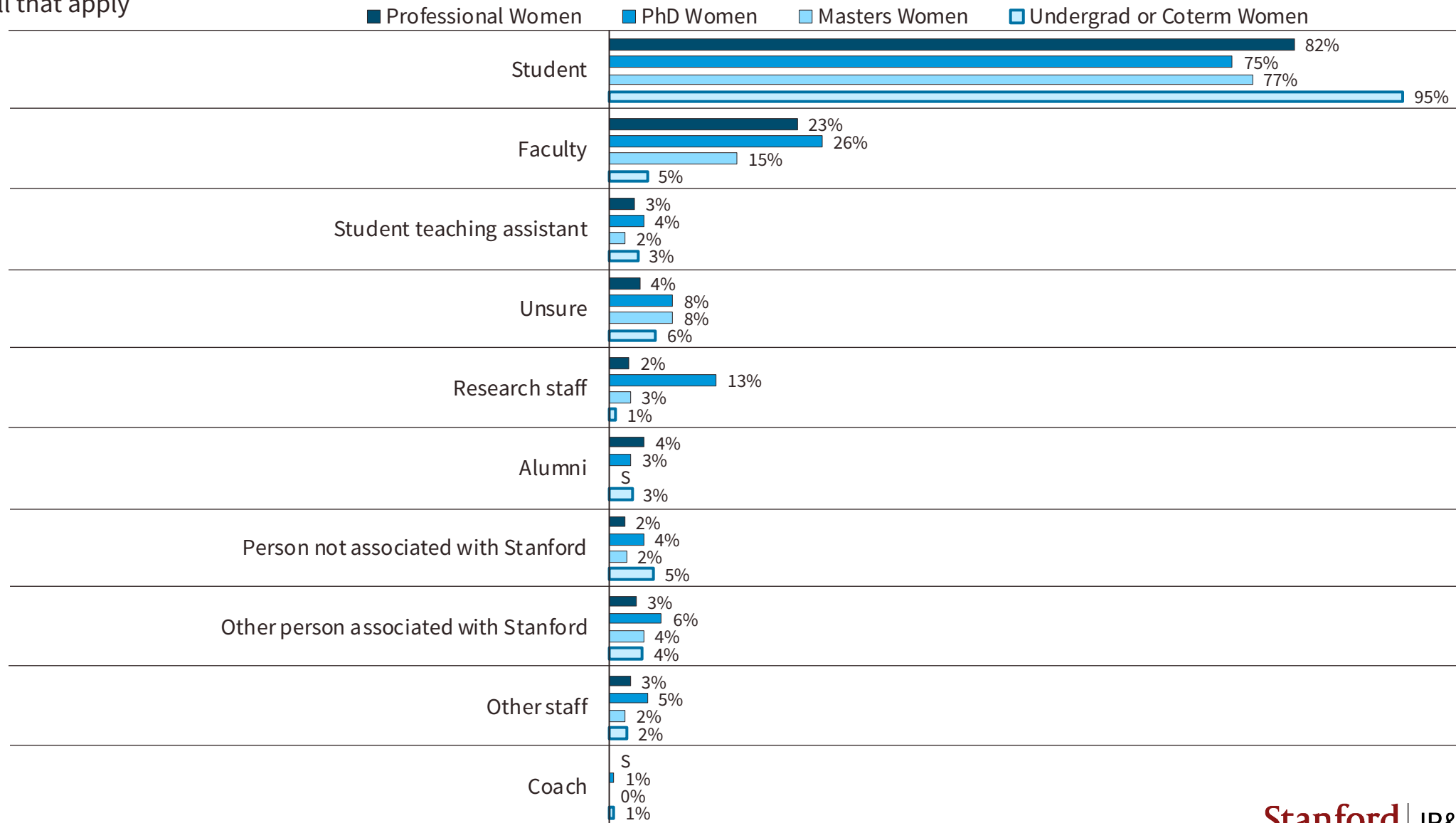

How was the person/were the persons **who did this to you associated** with Stanford? Percent of Women by degree who experienced at least one harassing behavior

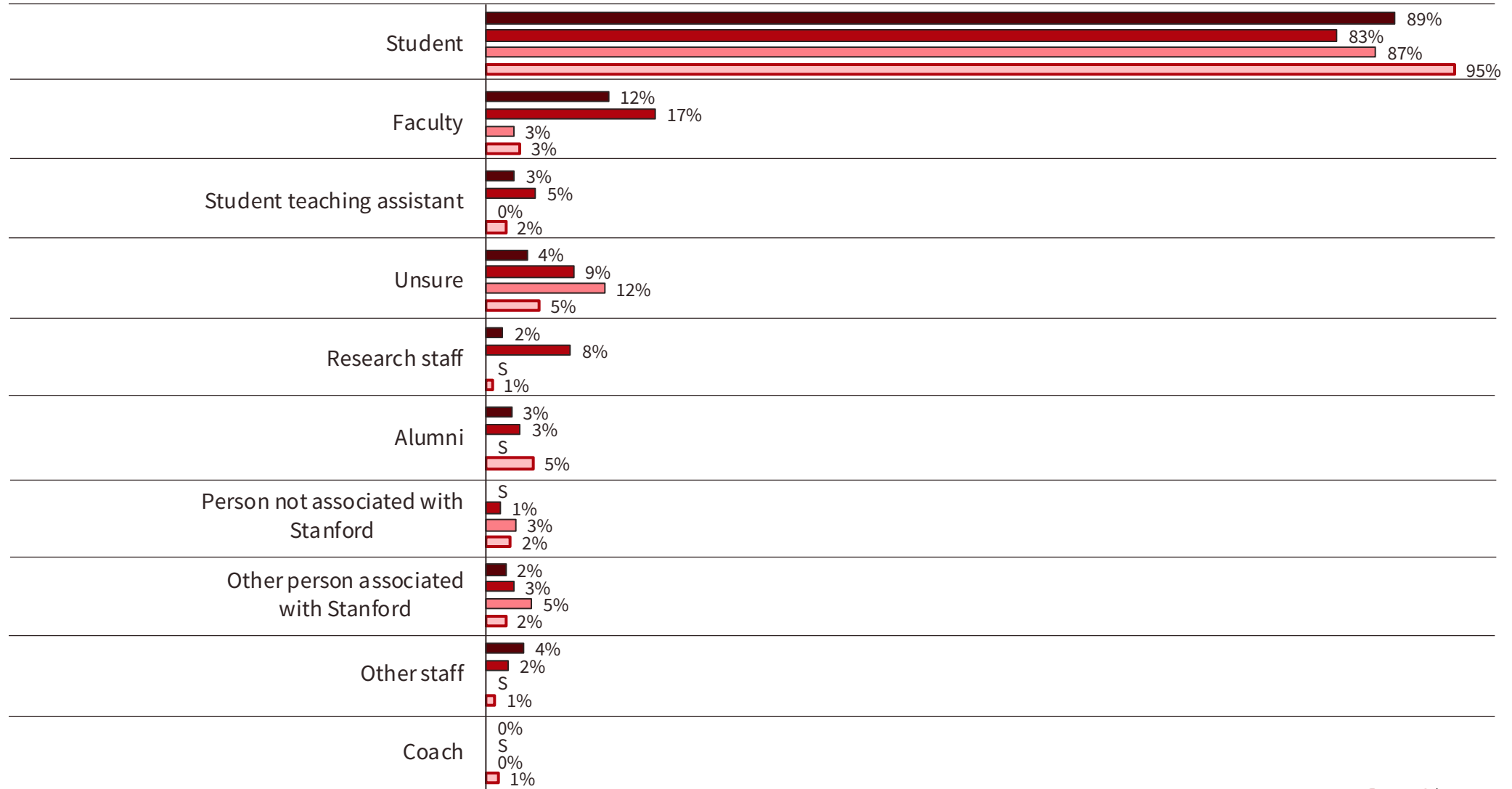

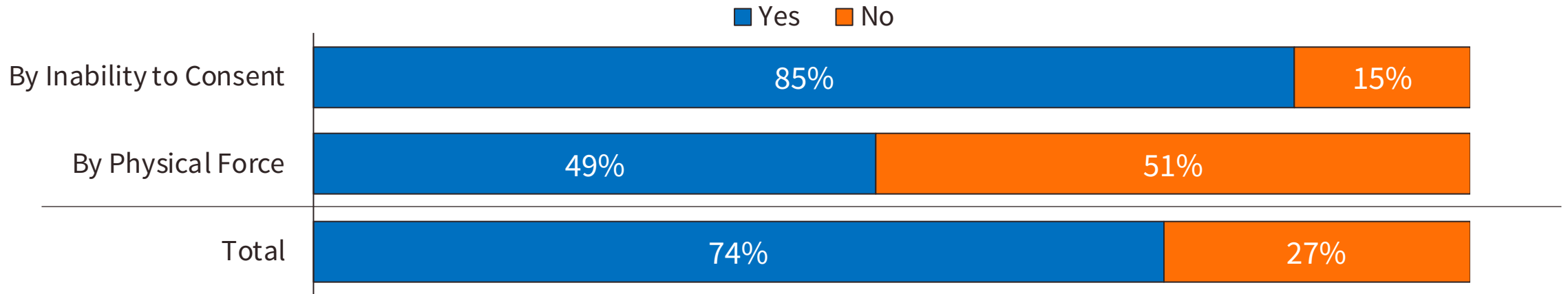

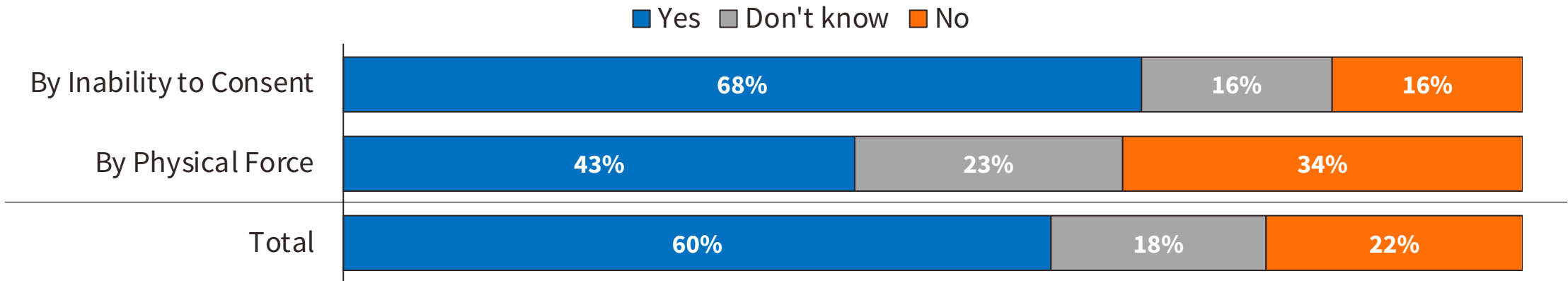

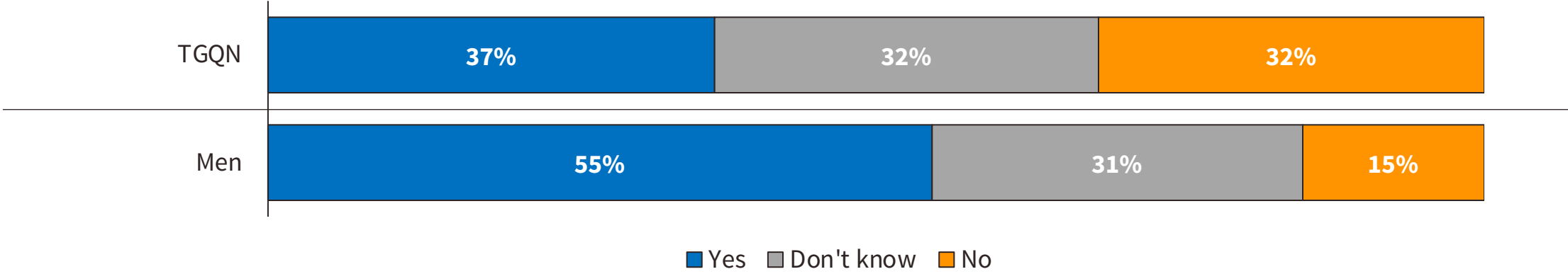

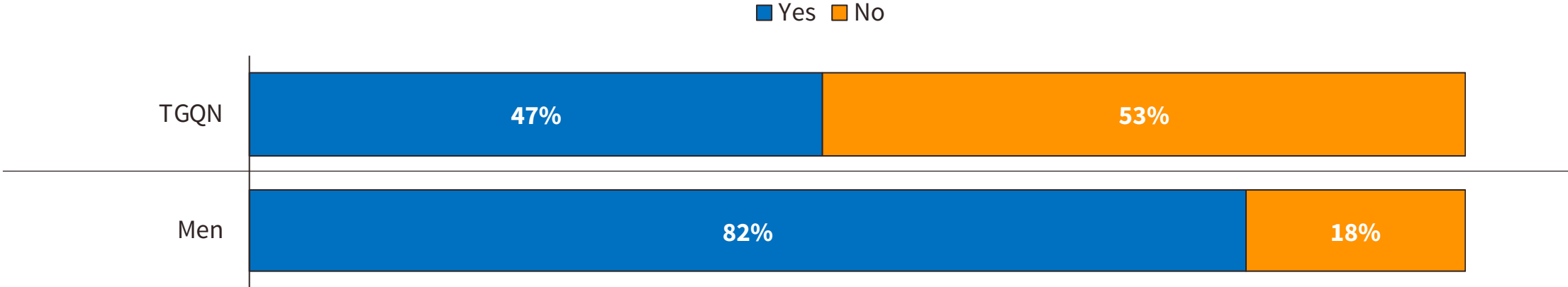
Men and TGQN* survey respondents: Percent of incidents of nonconsensual *penetration* (attempted or completed) involving physical force or inability to consent or stop what was happening

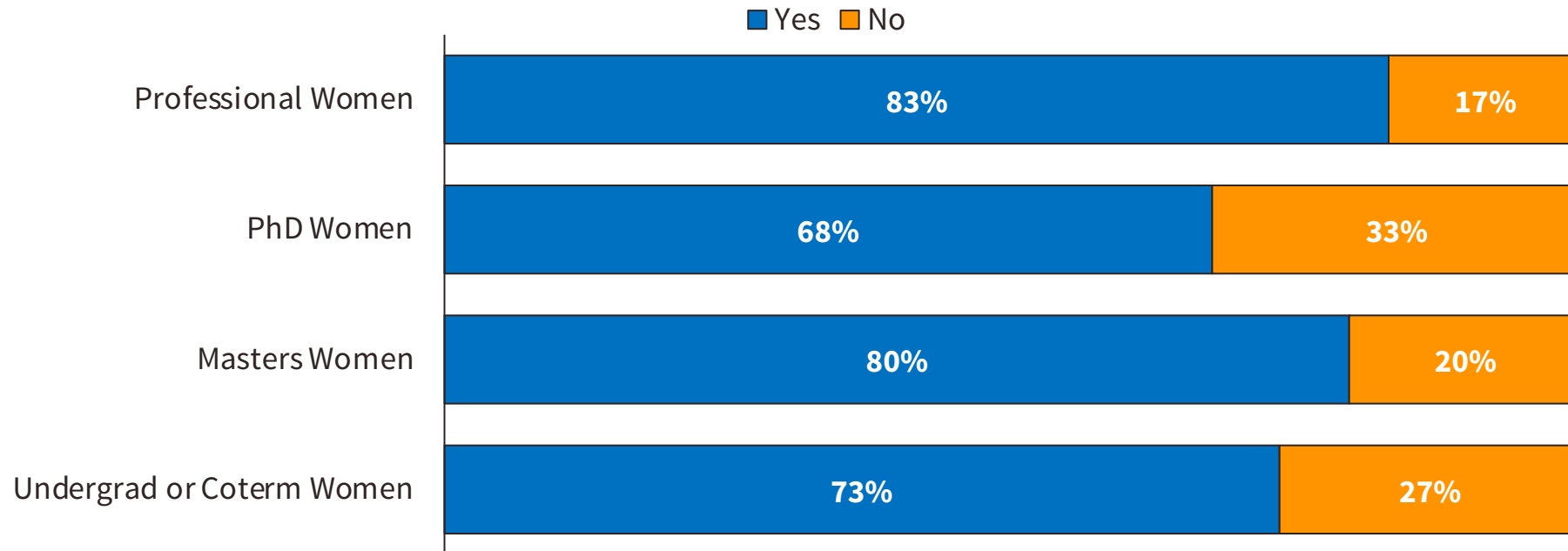

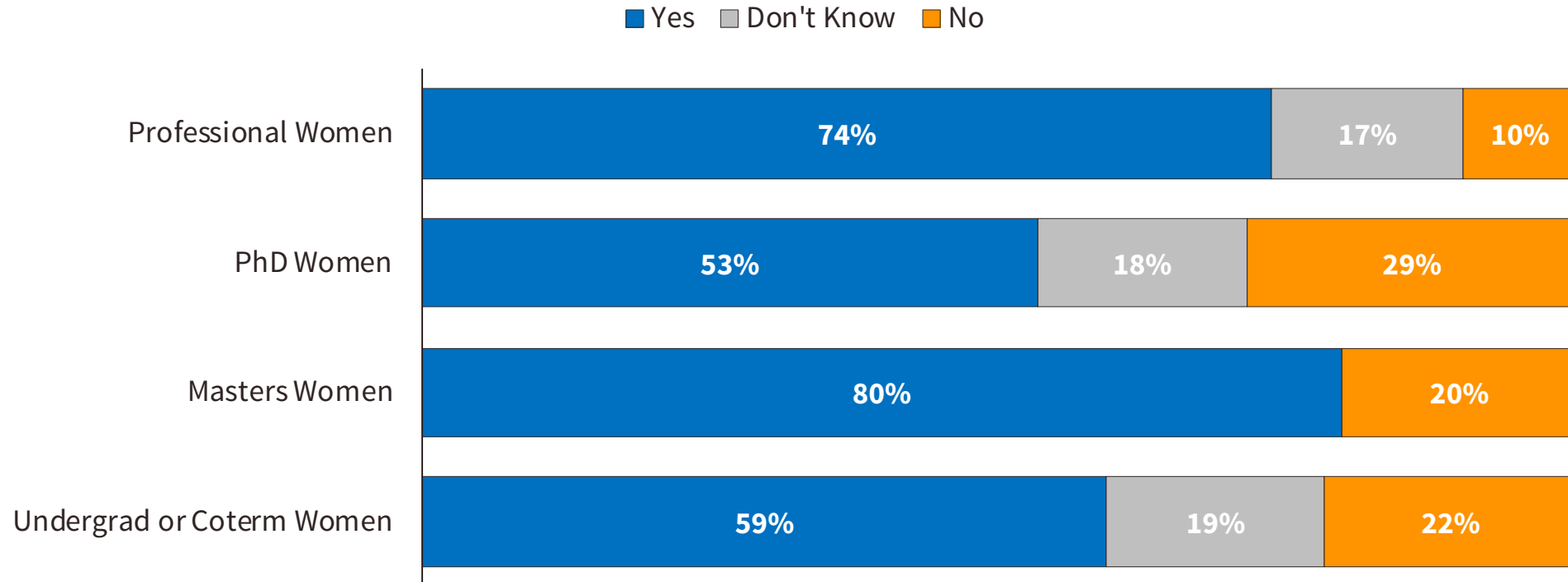

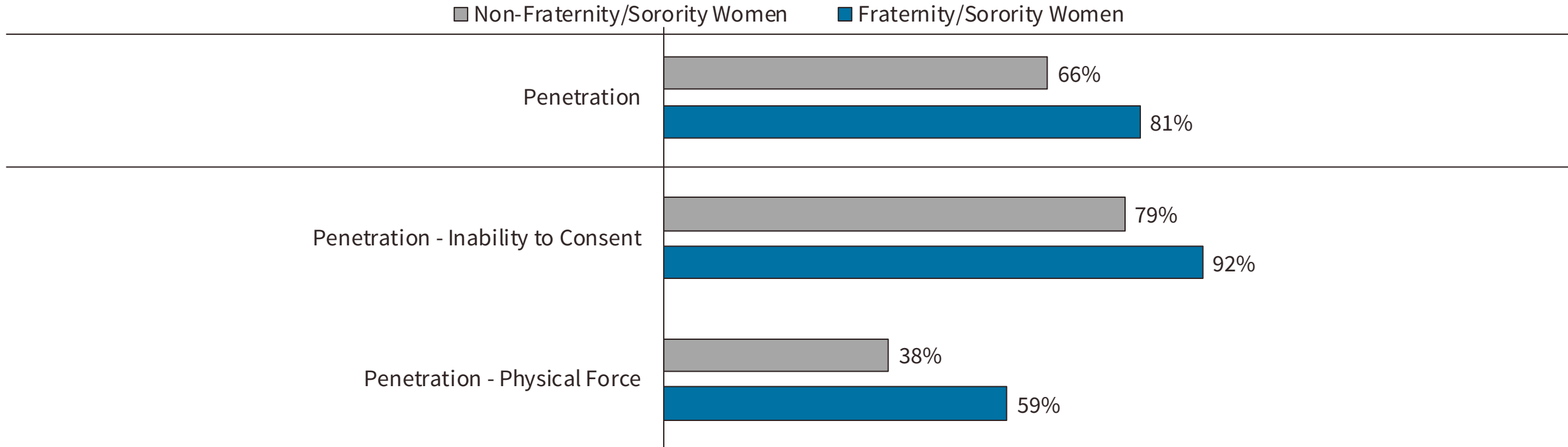

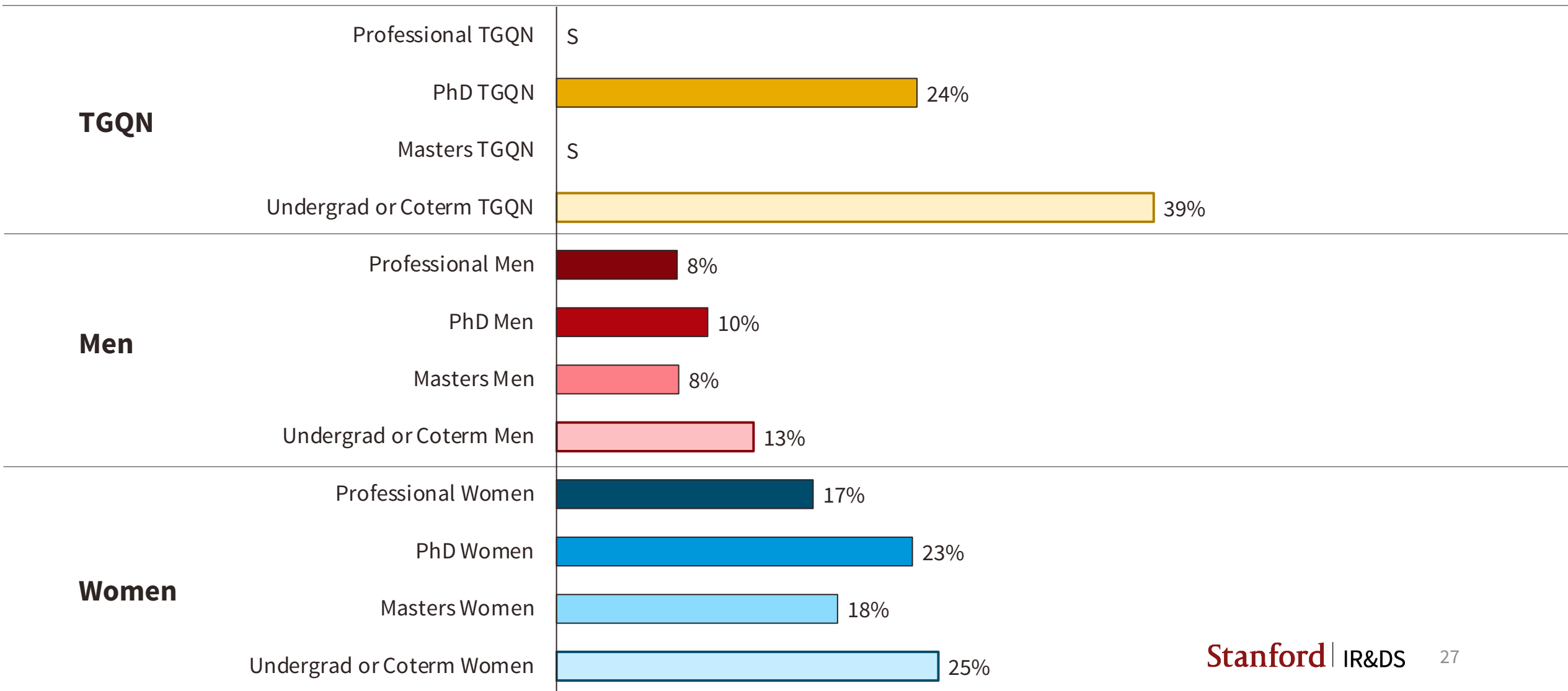

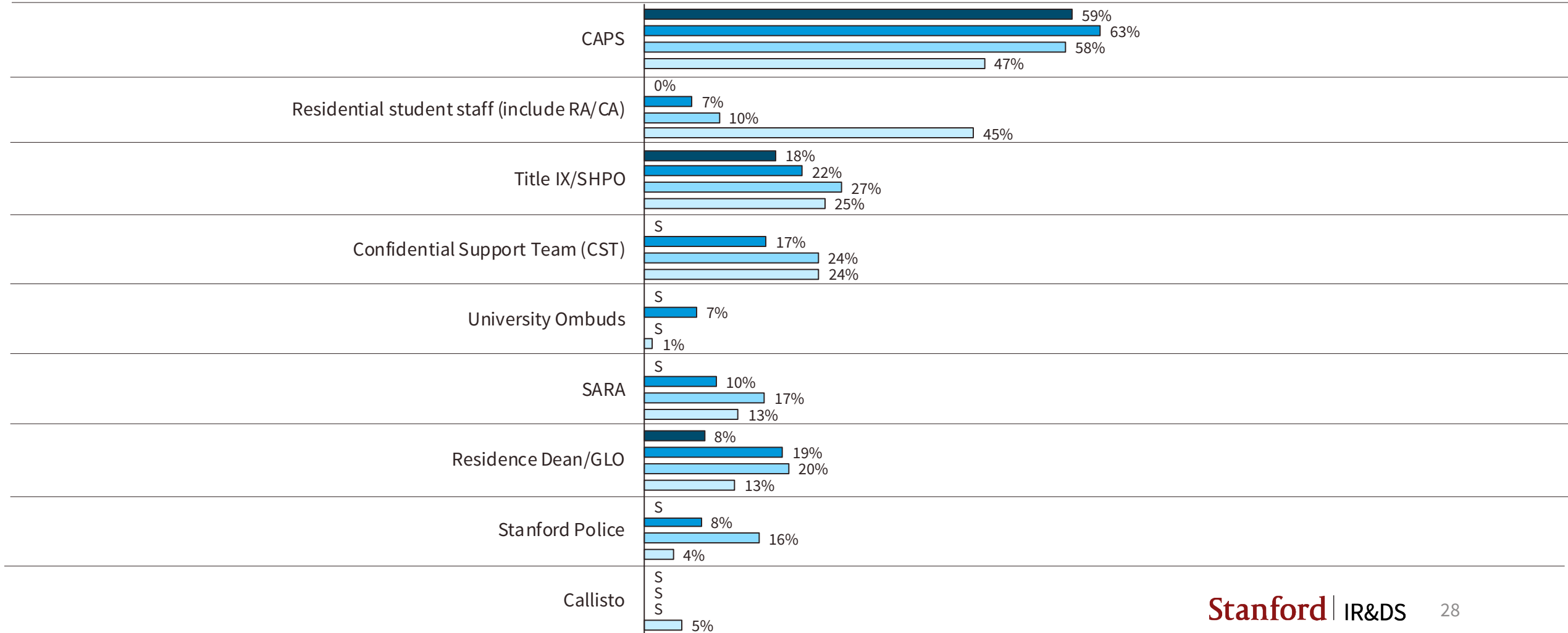

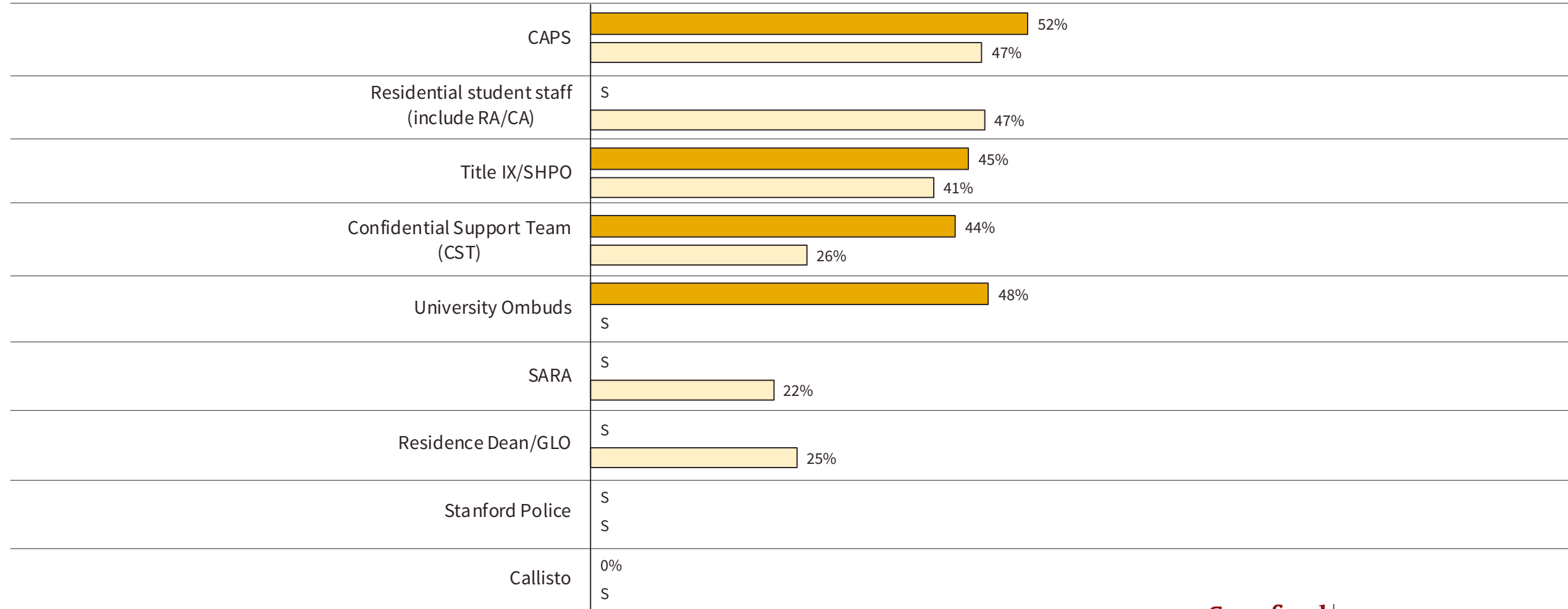

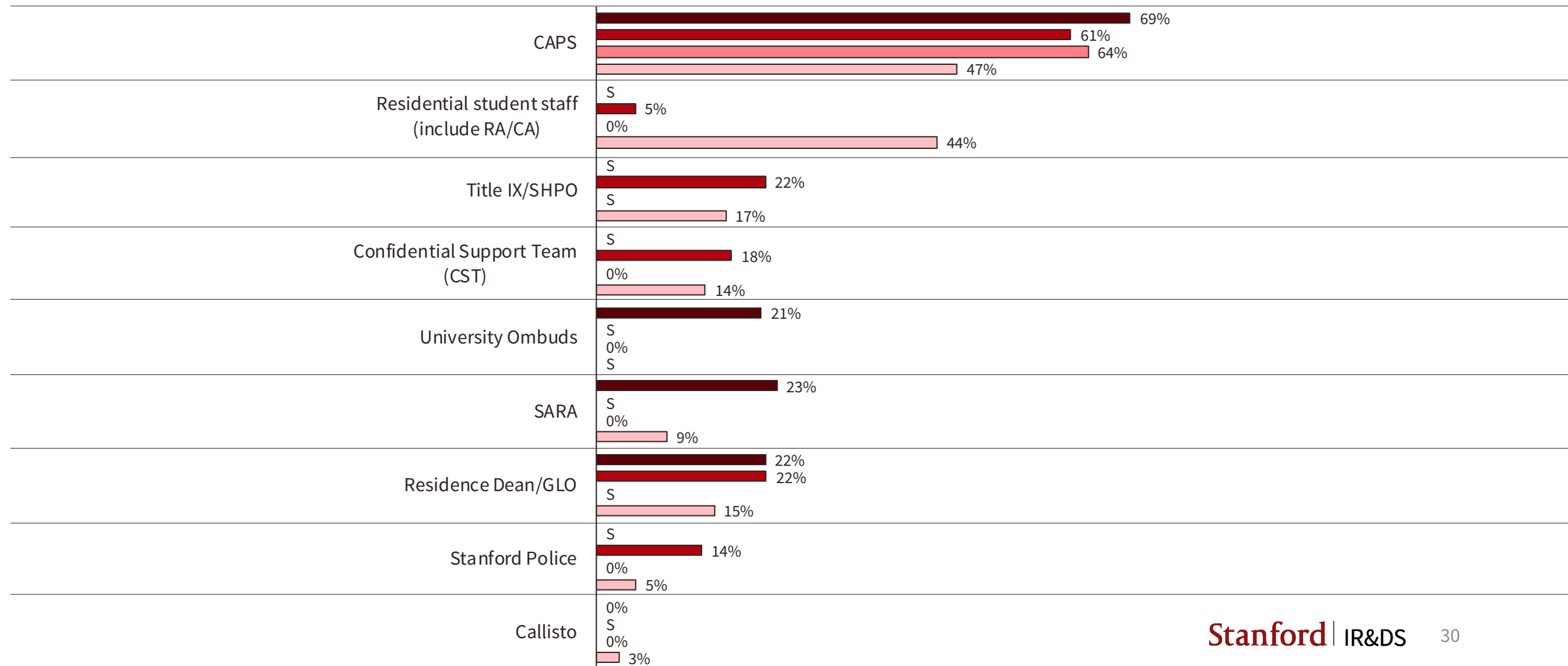

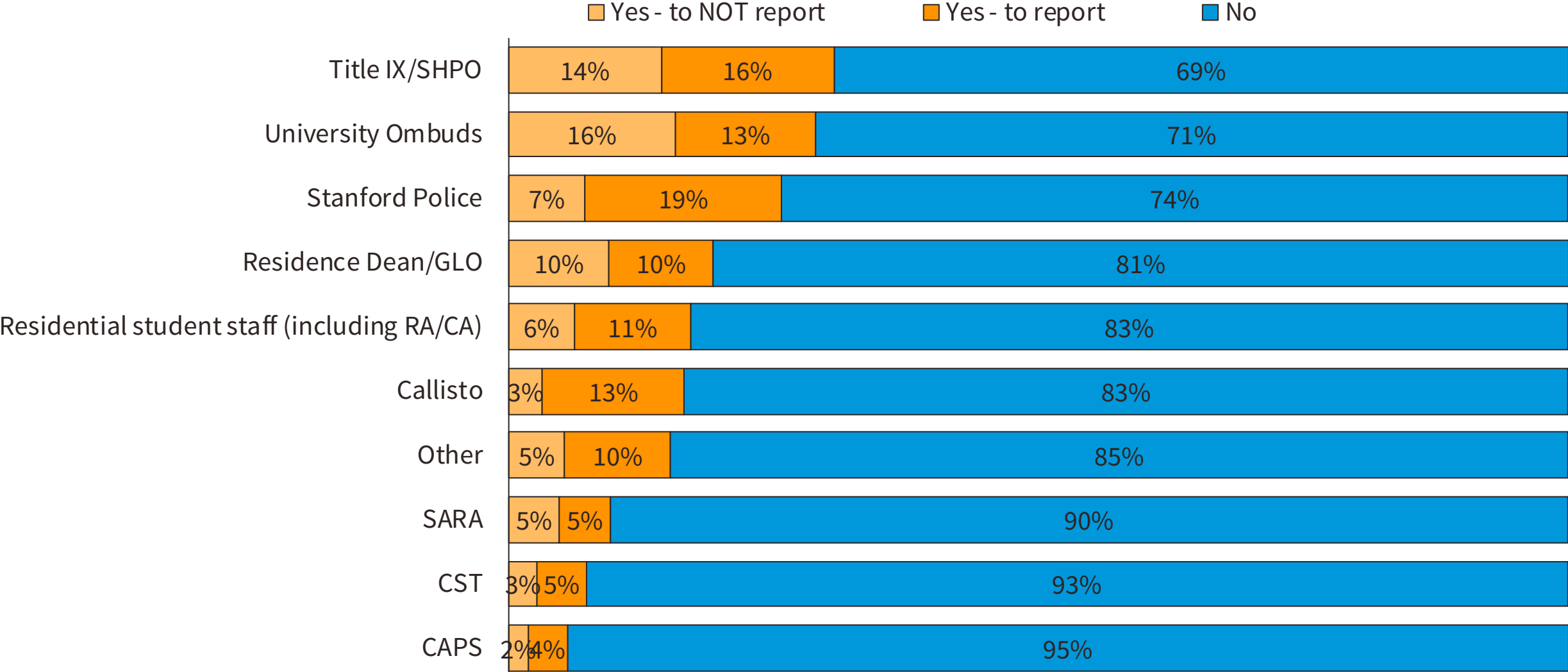

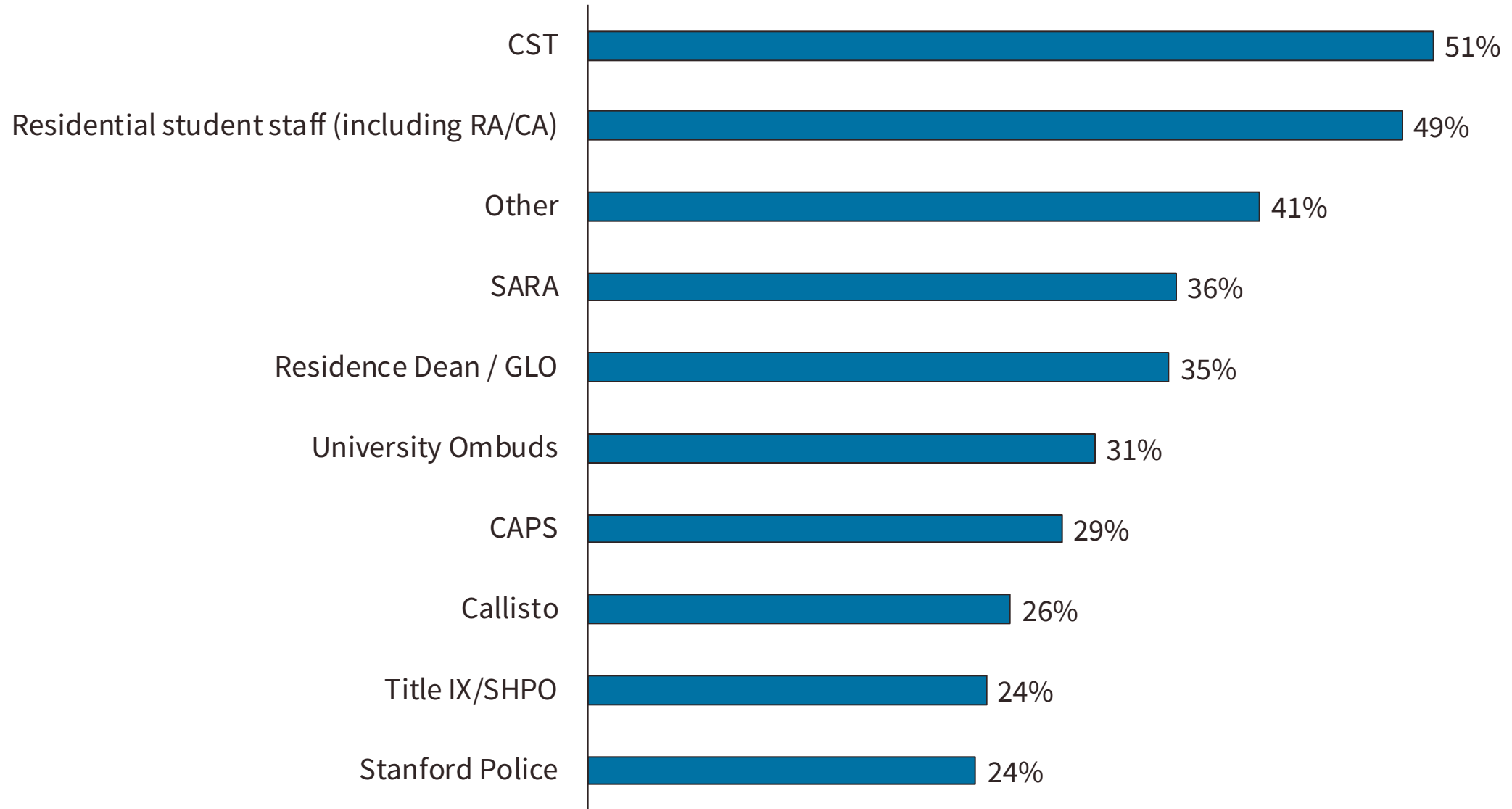
Percent of students who contacted at least one resource who **did or did not feel pressure** from any resource on whether or not to report or file a complaint

All students who contacted at least one resource



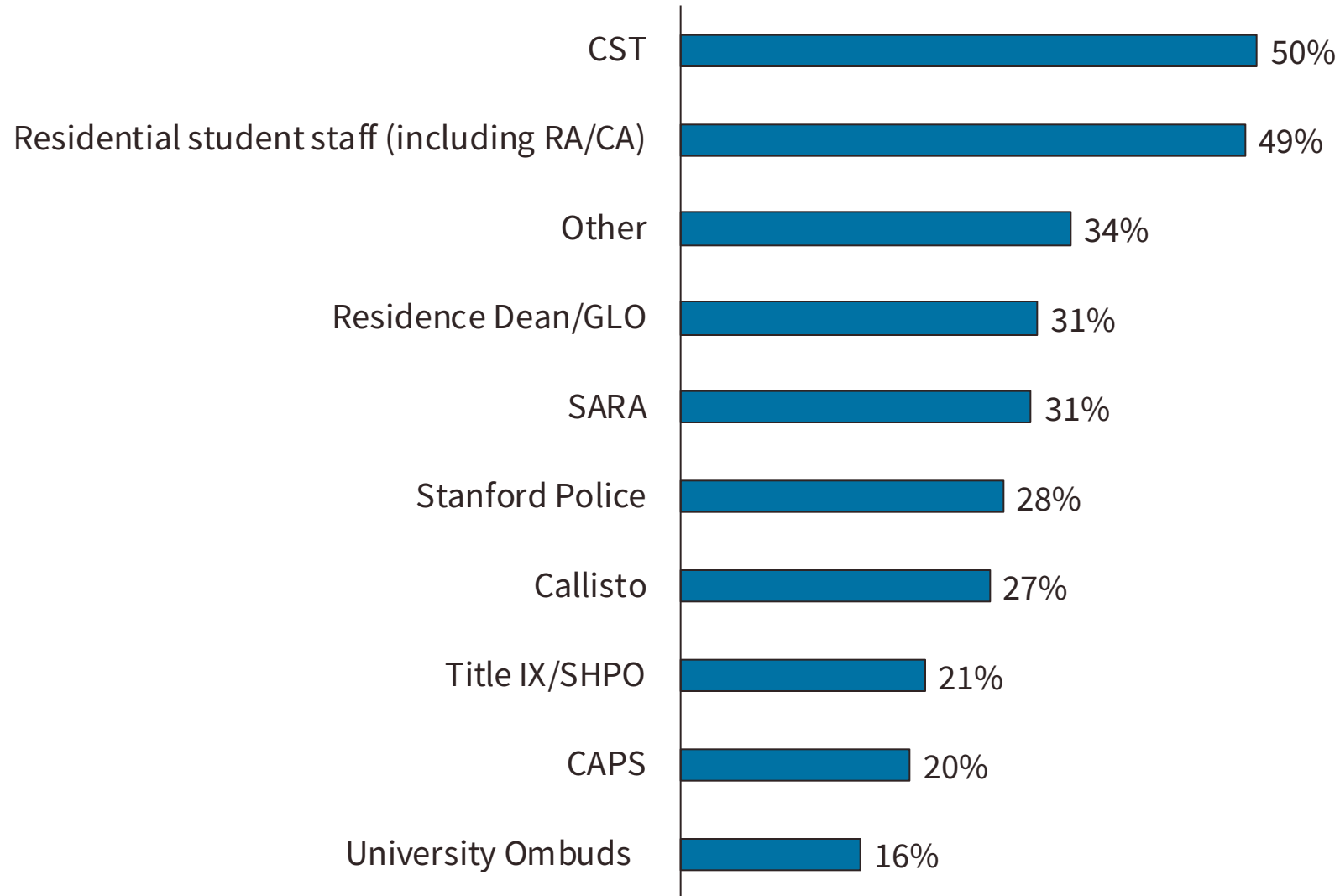
Percent of students who contacted at least one program who reported the resource was **“Very or Extremely”** useful in helping

All students who contacted at least one resource



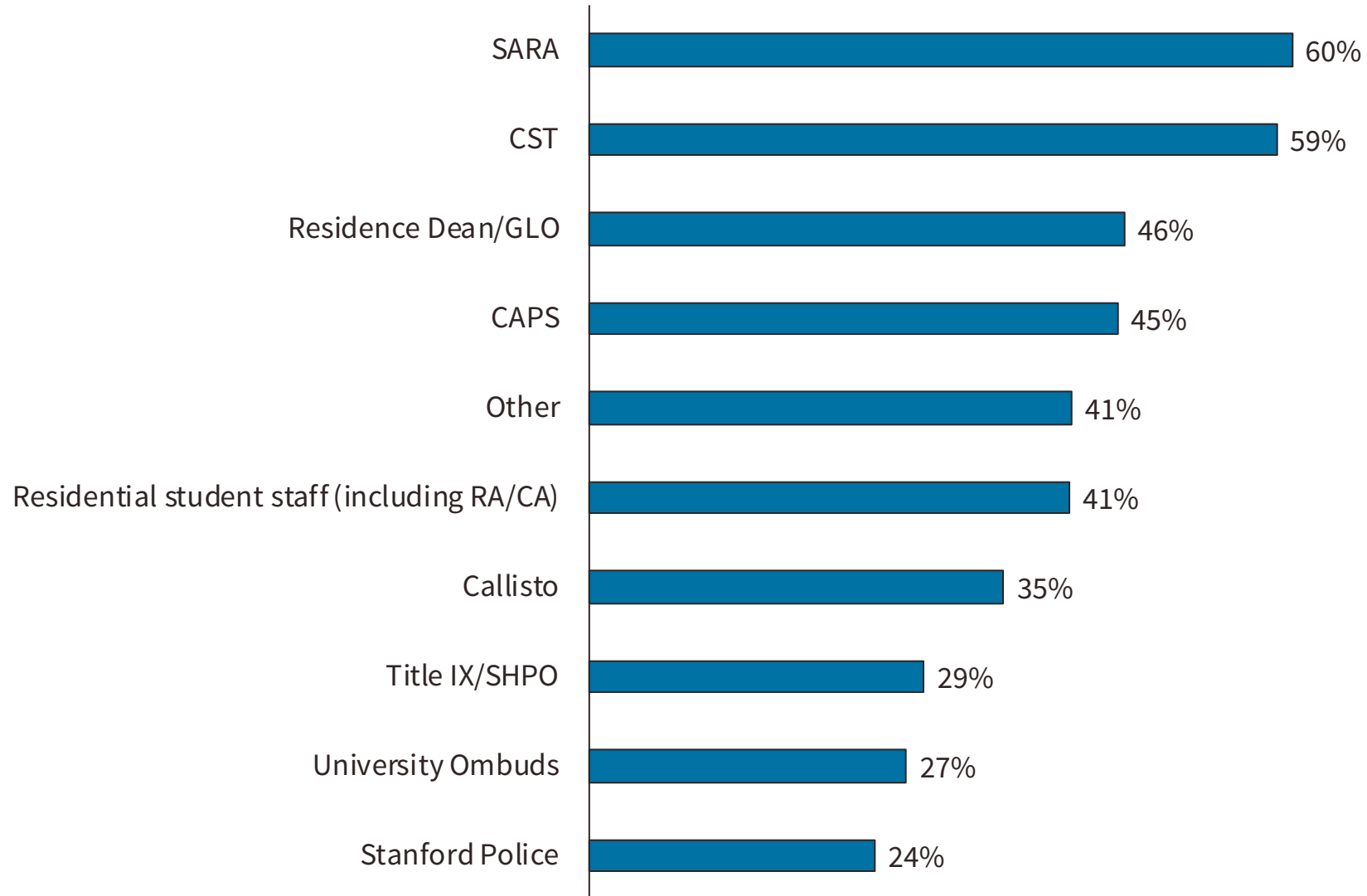
Percent of undergraduate and coterm students who contacted at least one program who reported the resource was “**Very or Extremely**” useful in helping

All Undergraduate and Coterm students who contacted at least one resource



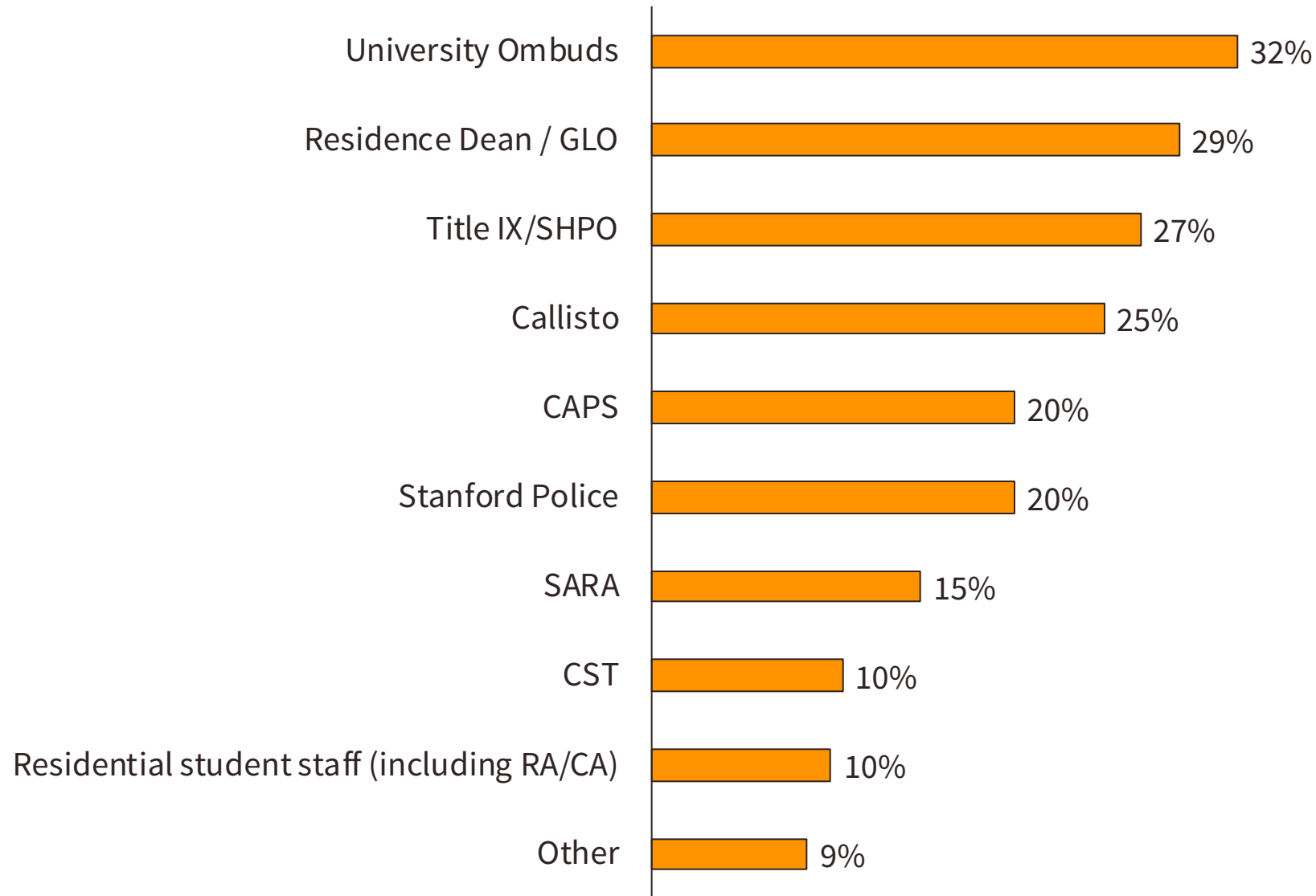
Percent of PhD students who contacted at least one program who reported the resource was “**Very or Extremely**” useful in helping

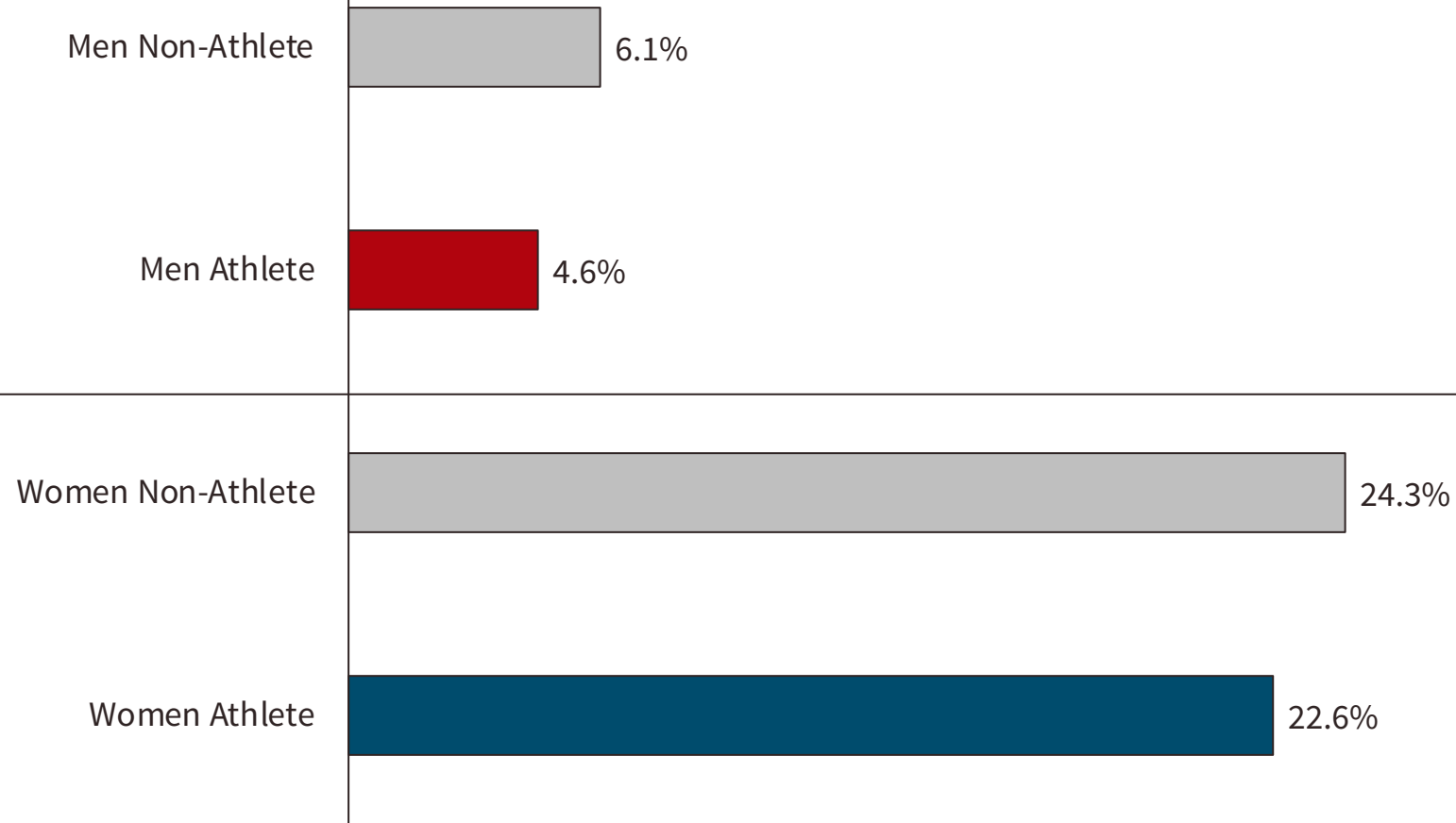

by **physical force or inability to consent** since entering Stanford

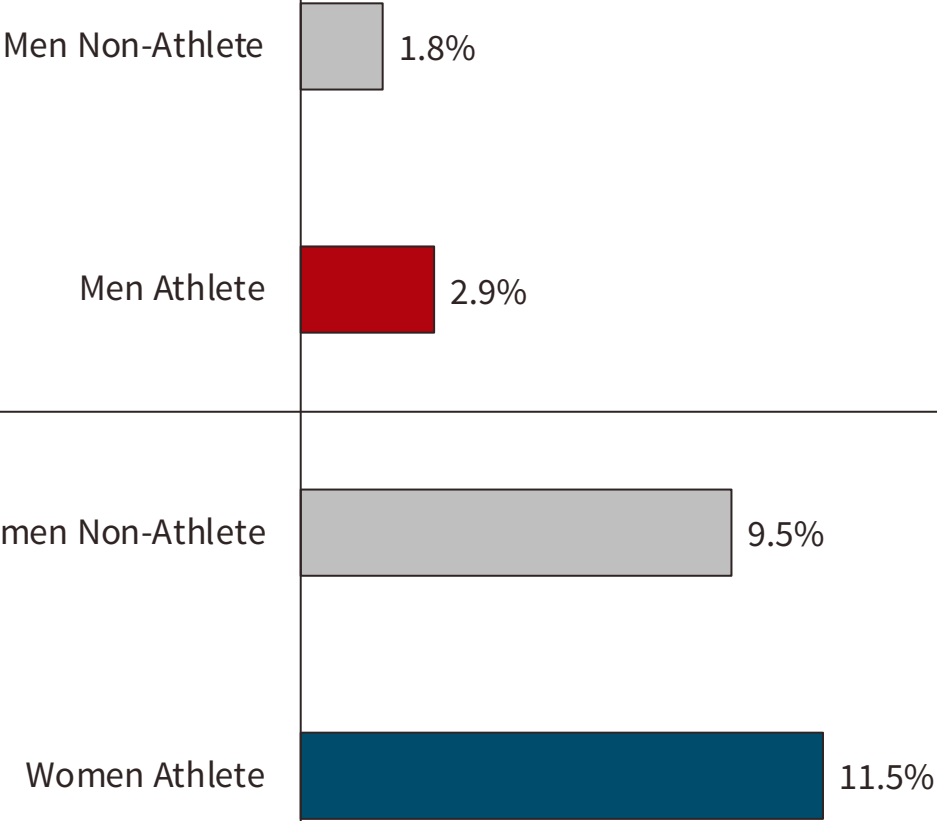
NCAA Athletes* by gender

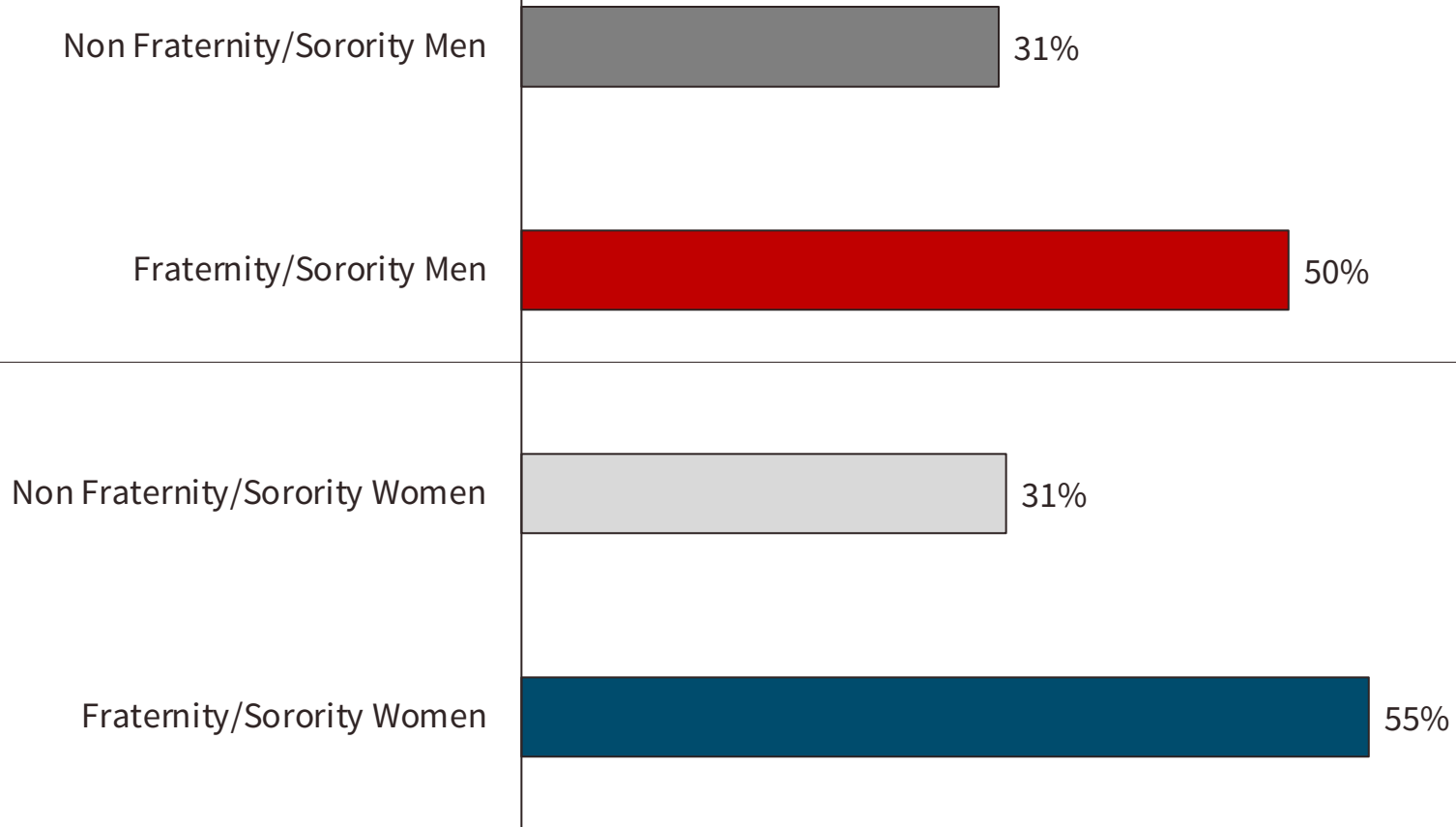

Fraternity/sorority organization membership* by gender

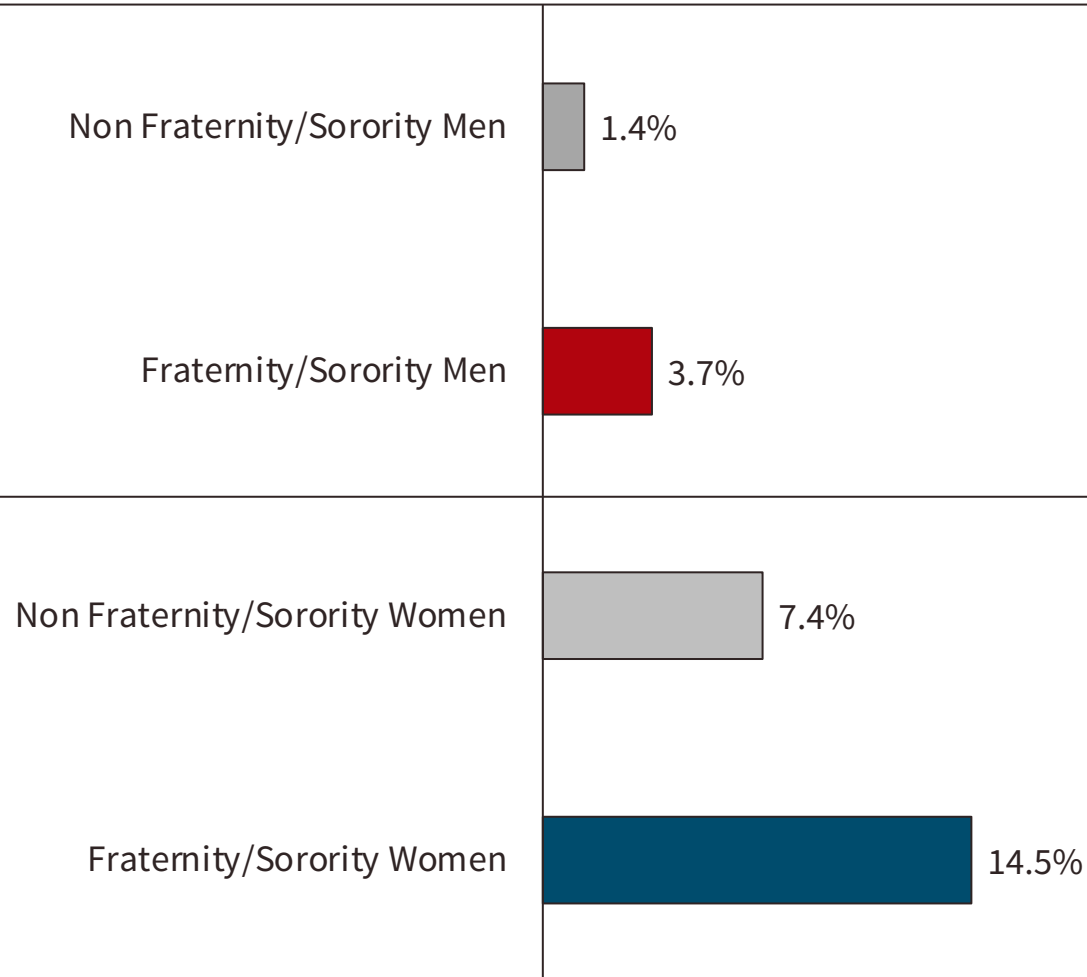

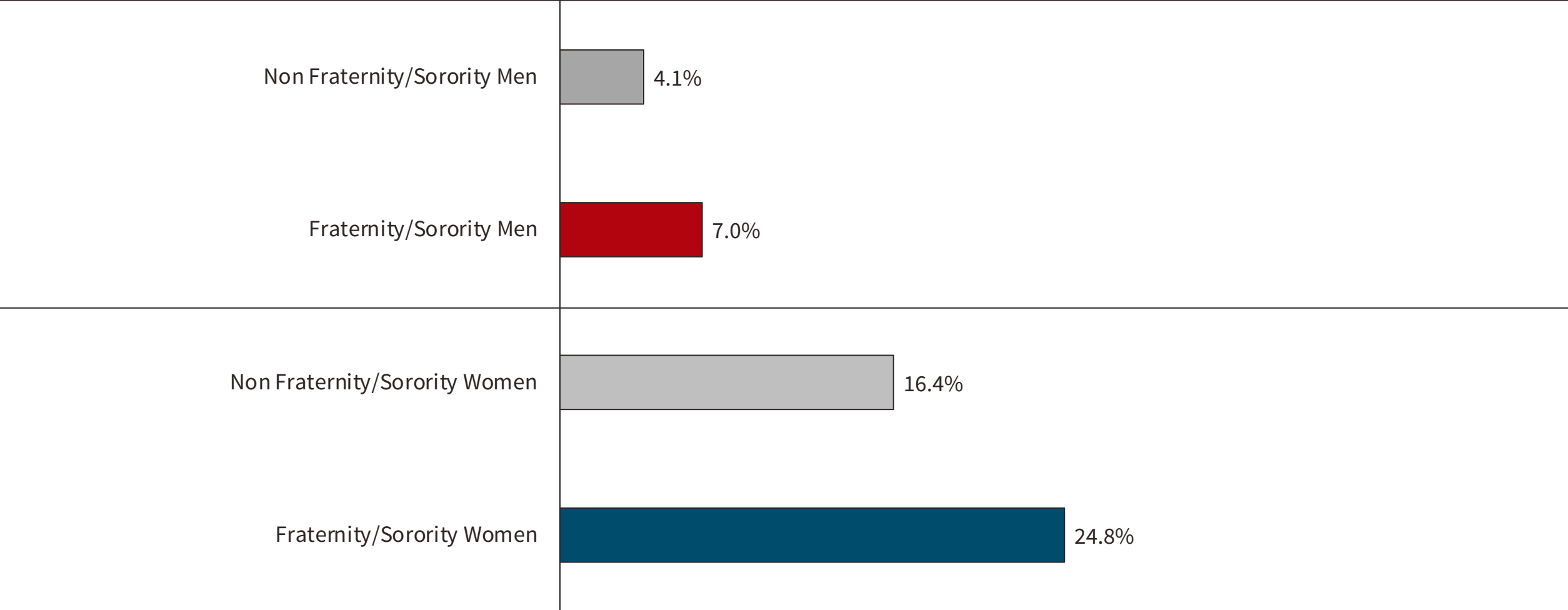

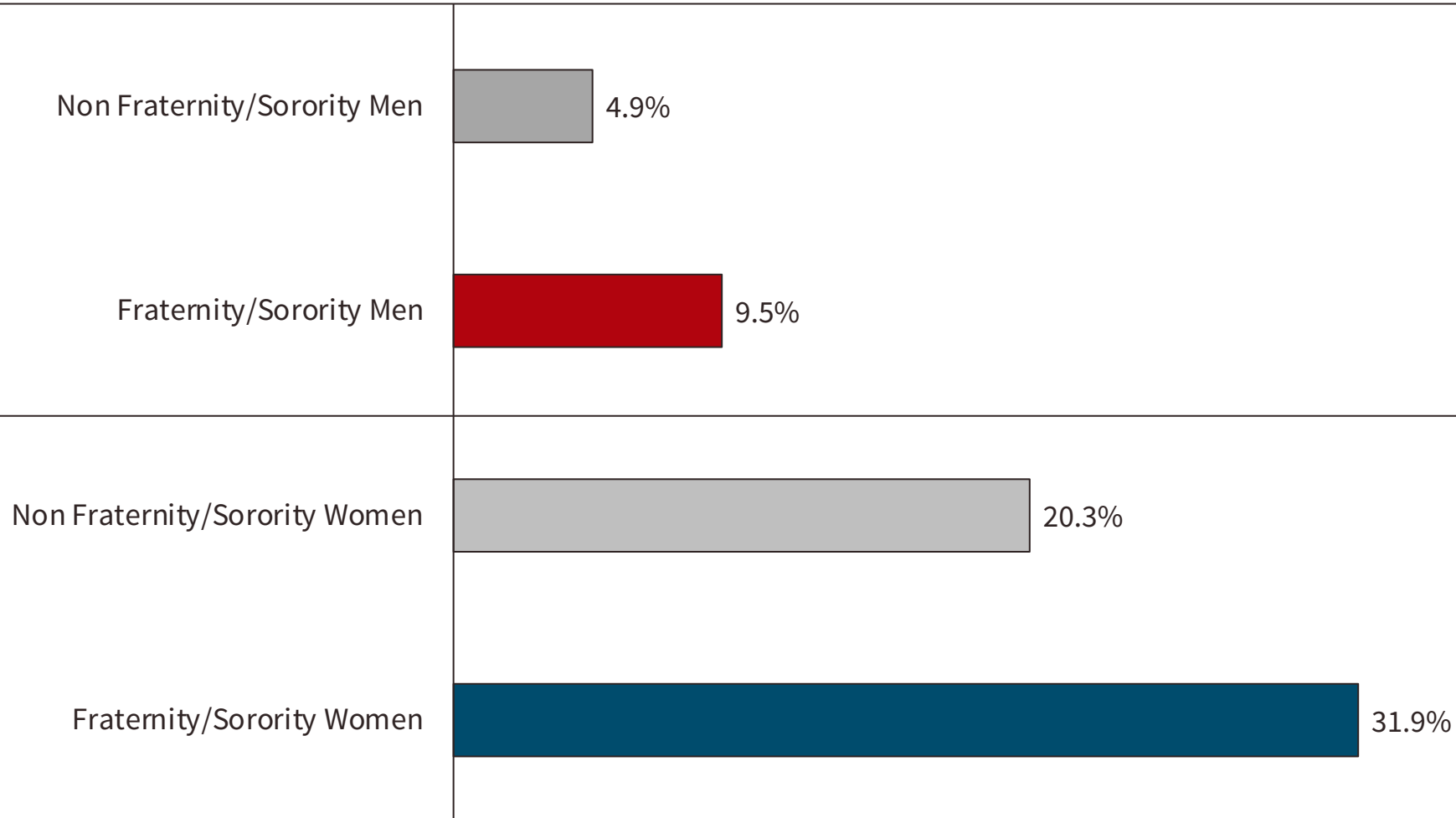
Percent of undergraduates and coterms who experienced *nonconsensual sexual touching* by **physical force or inability to consent** since entering Stanford

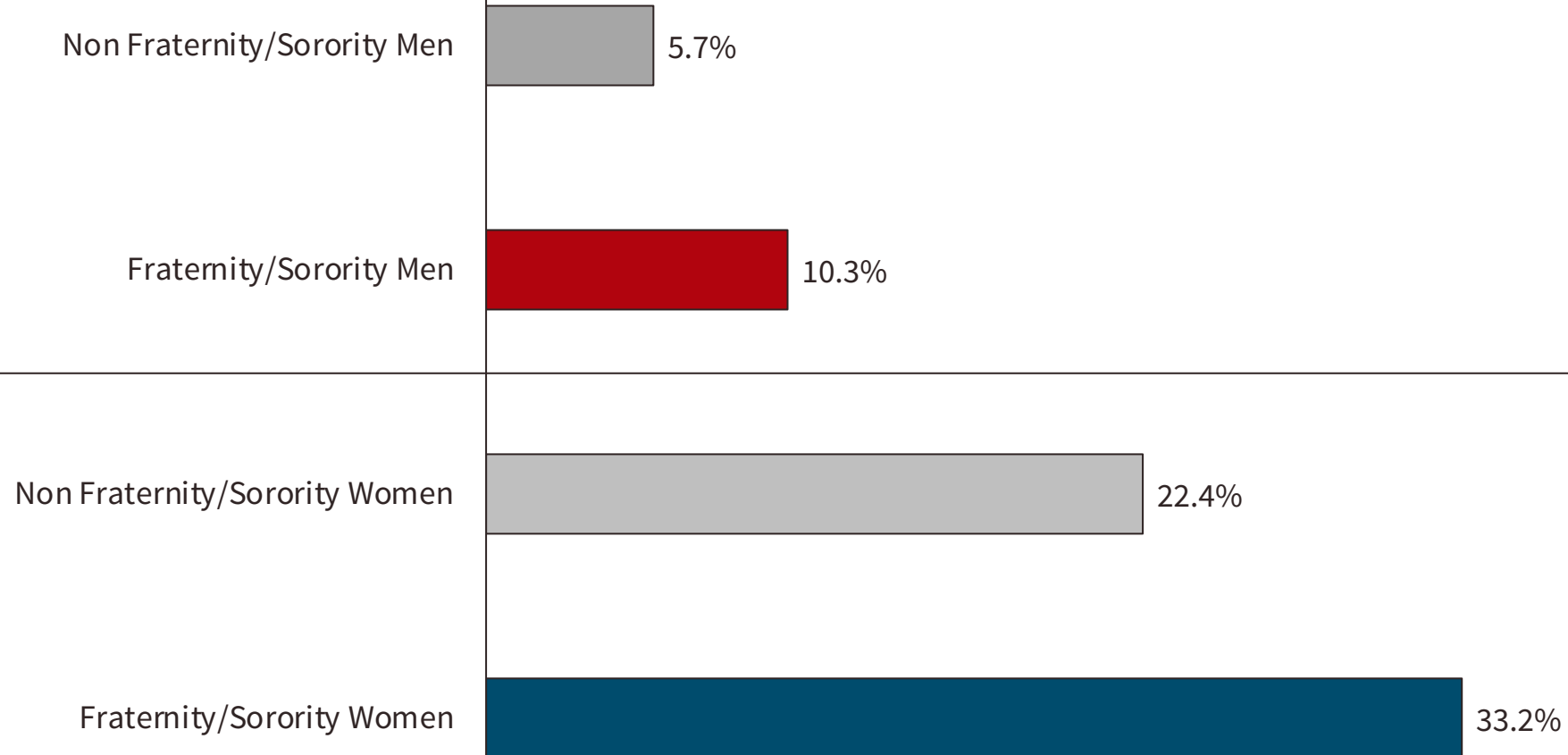

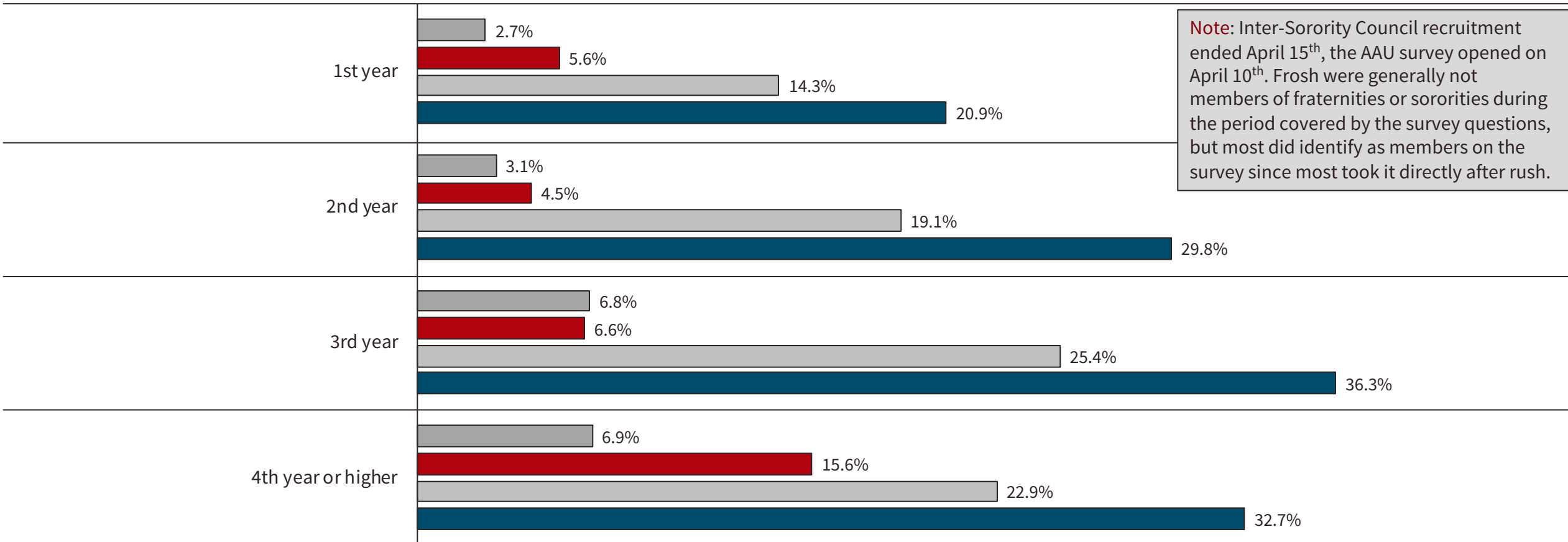

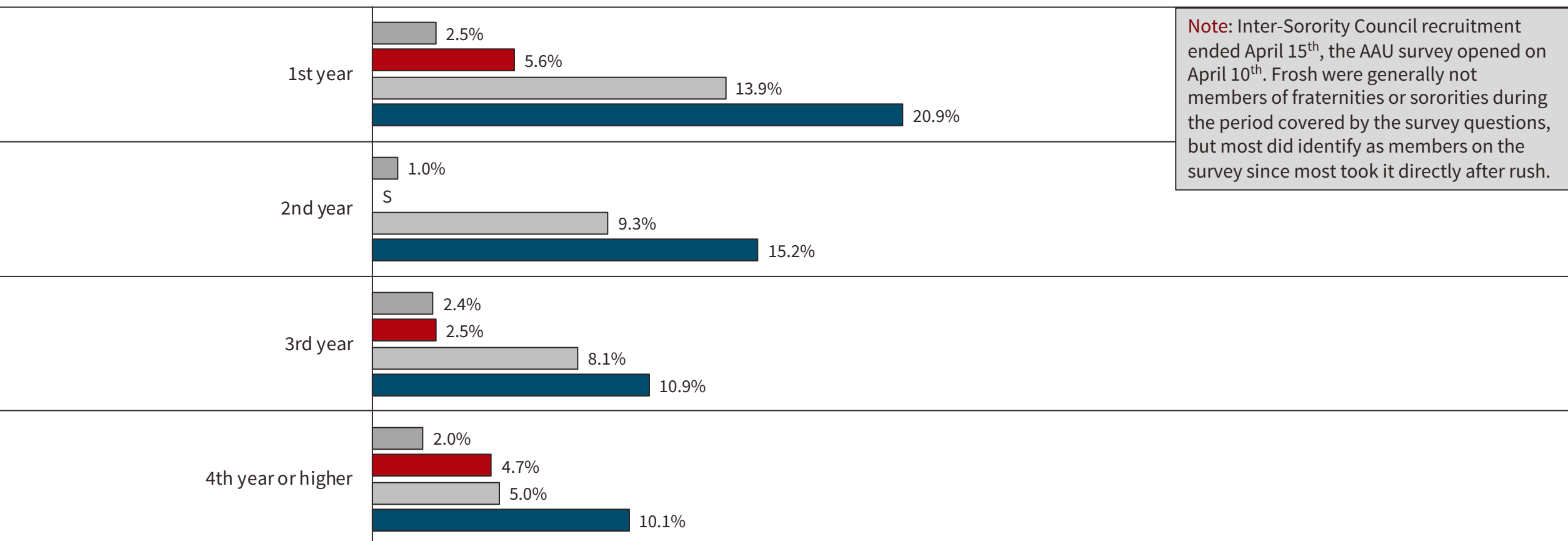

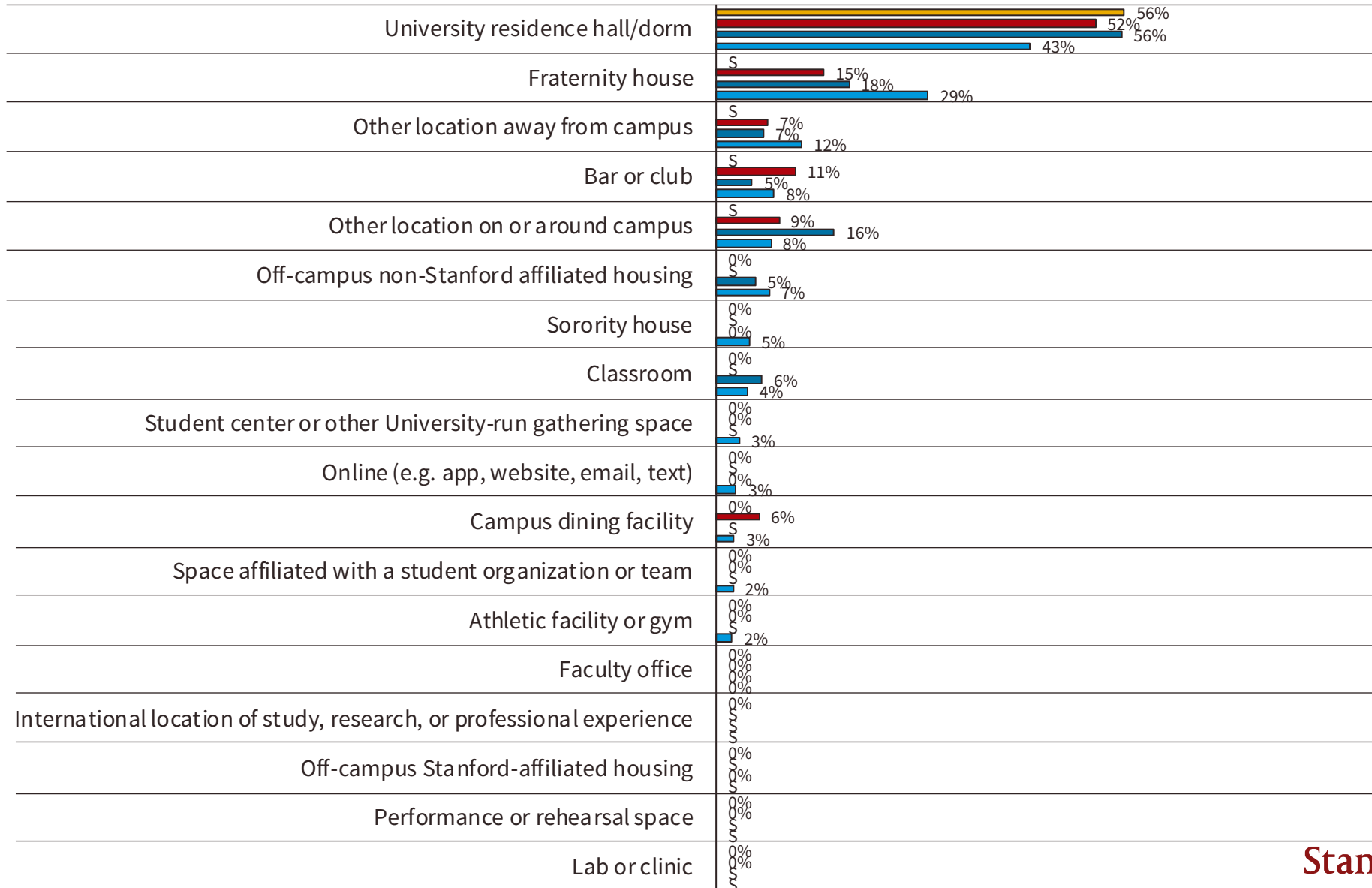

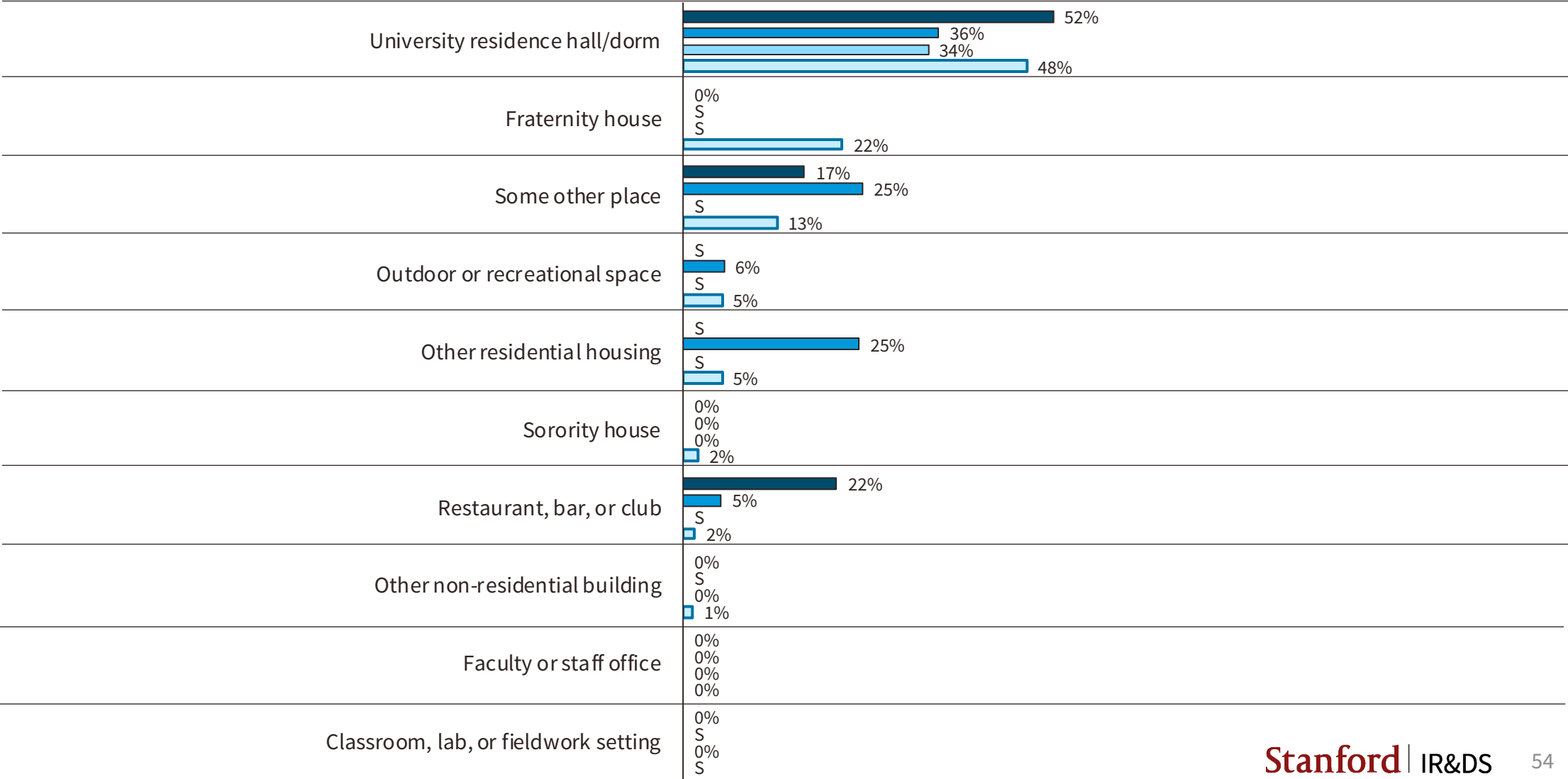


Location of incidents* of nonconsensual sexual contact by physical force or inability to consent or stop what was happening since entering Stanford

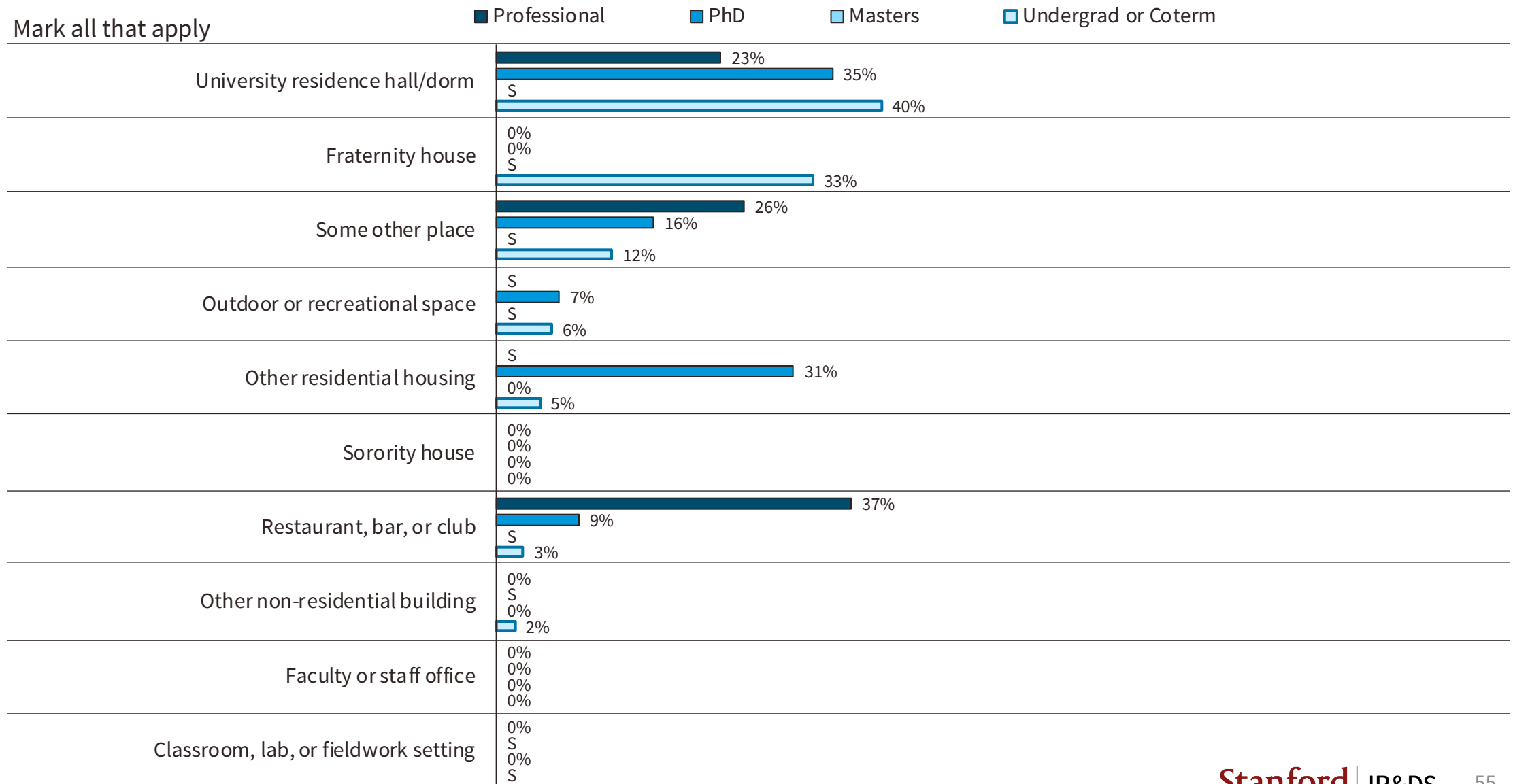

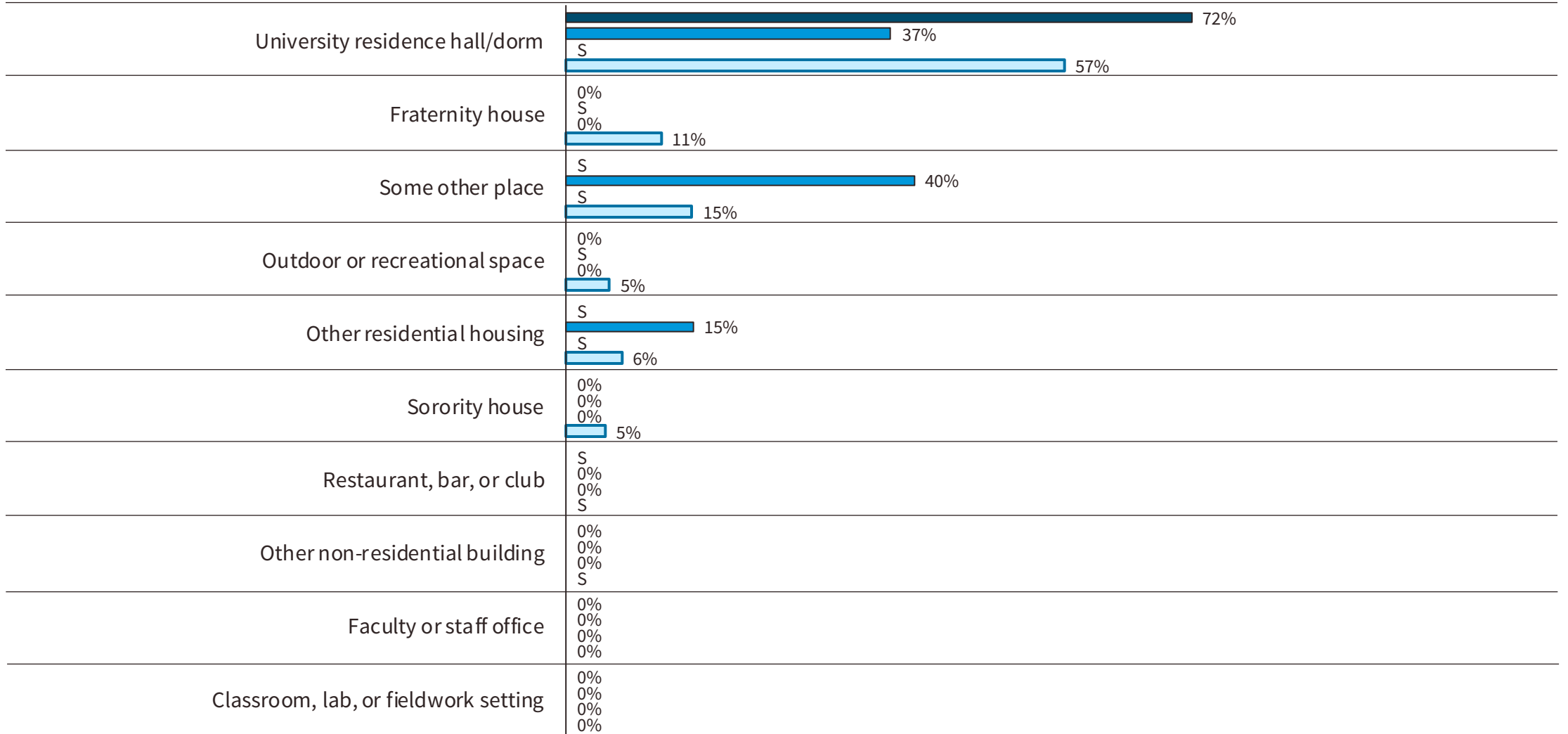

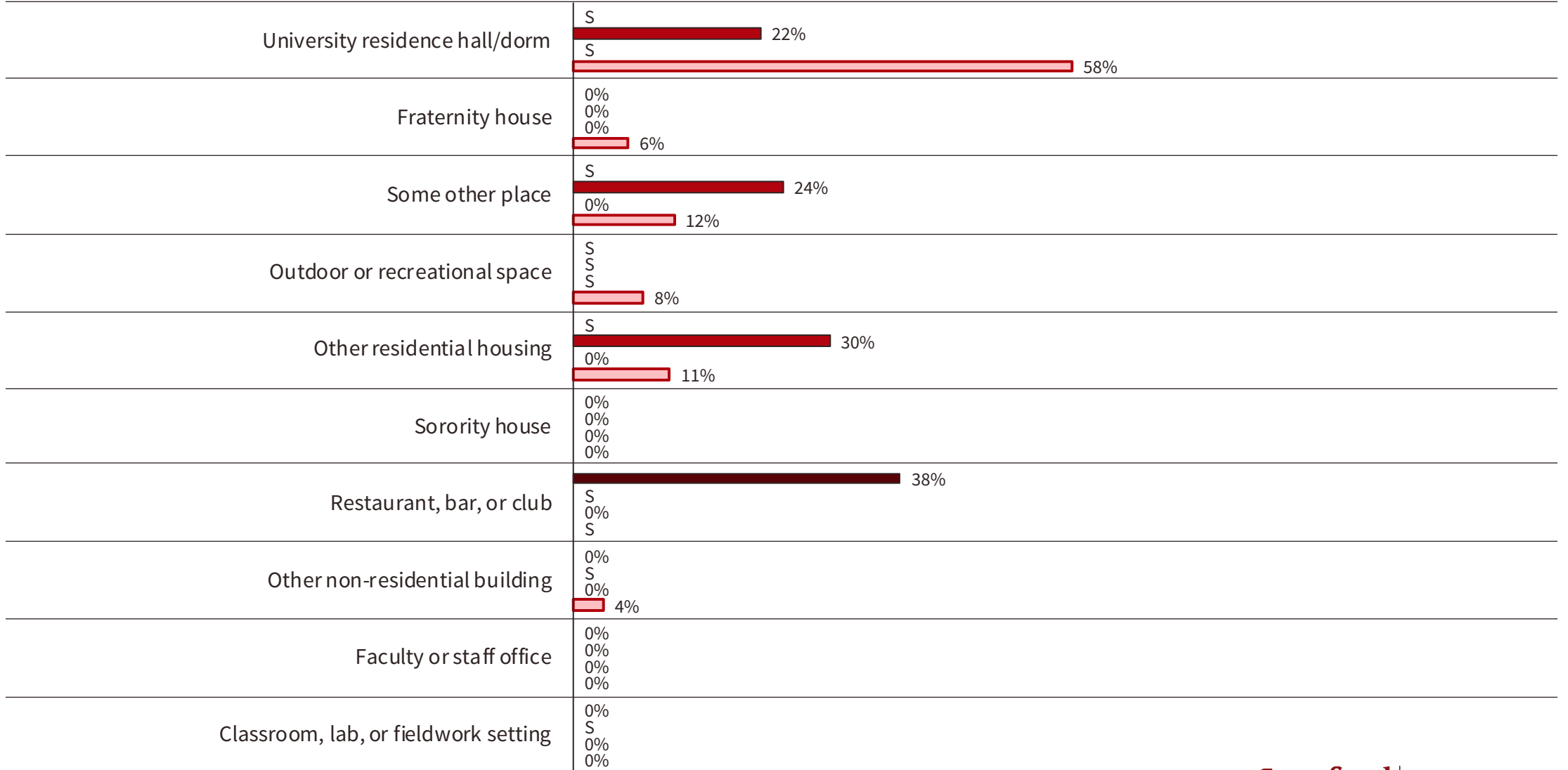

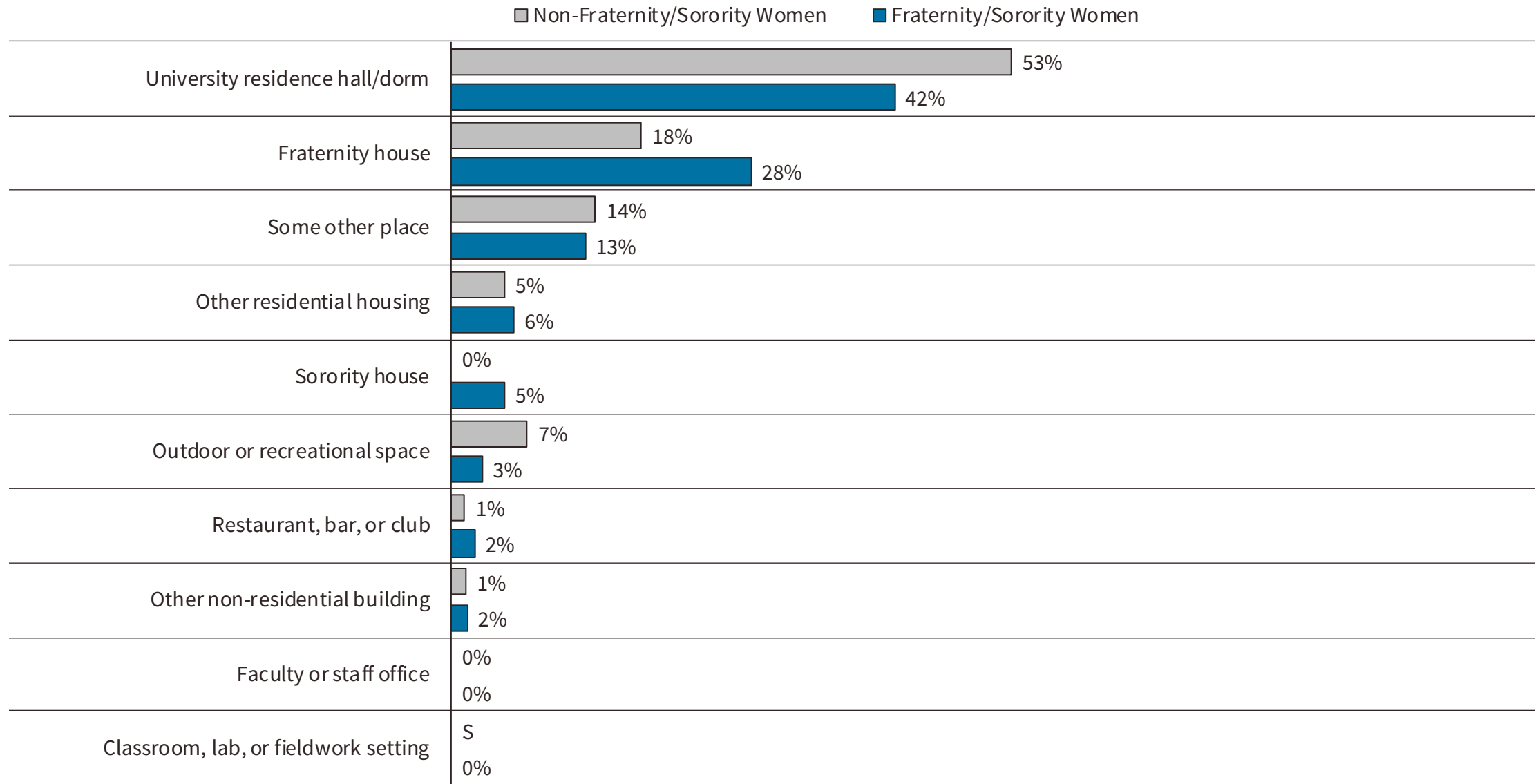

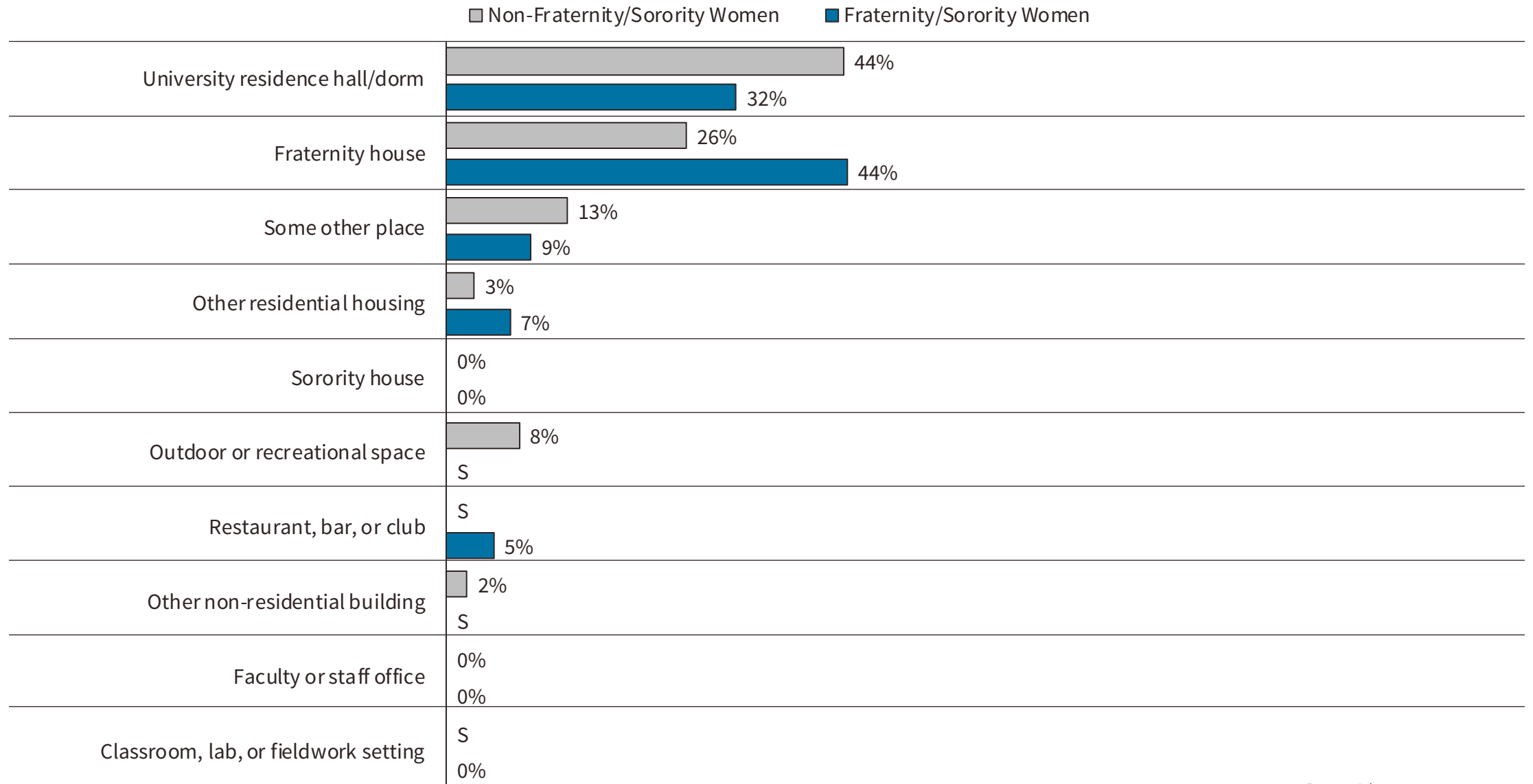
Undergraduate and coterm women by fraternity/sorority organization* membership

Location of incidents* of sexual touching by physical force or inability to consent or stop what was happening since entering Stanford

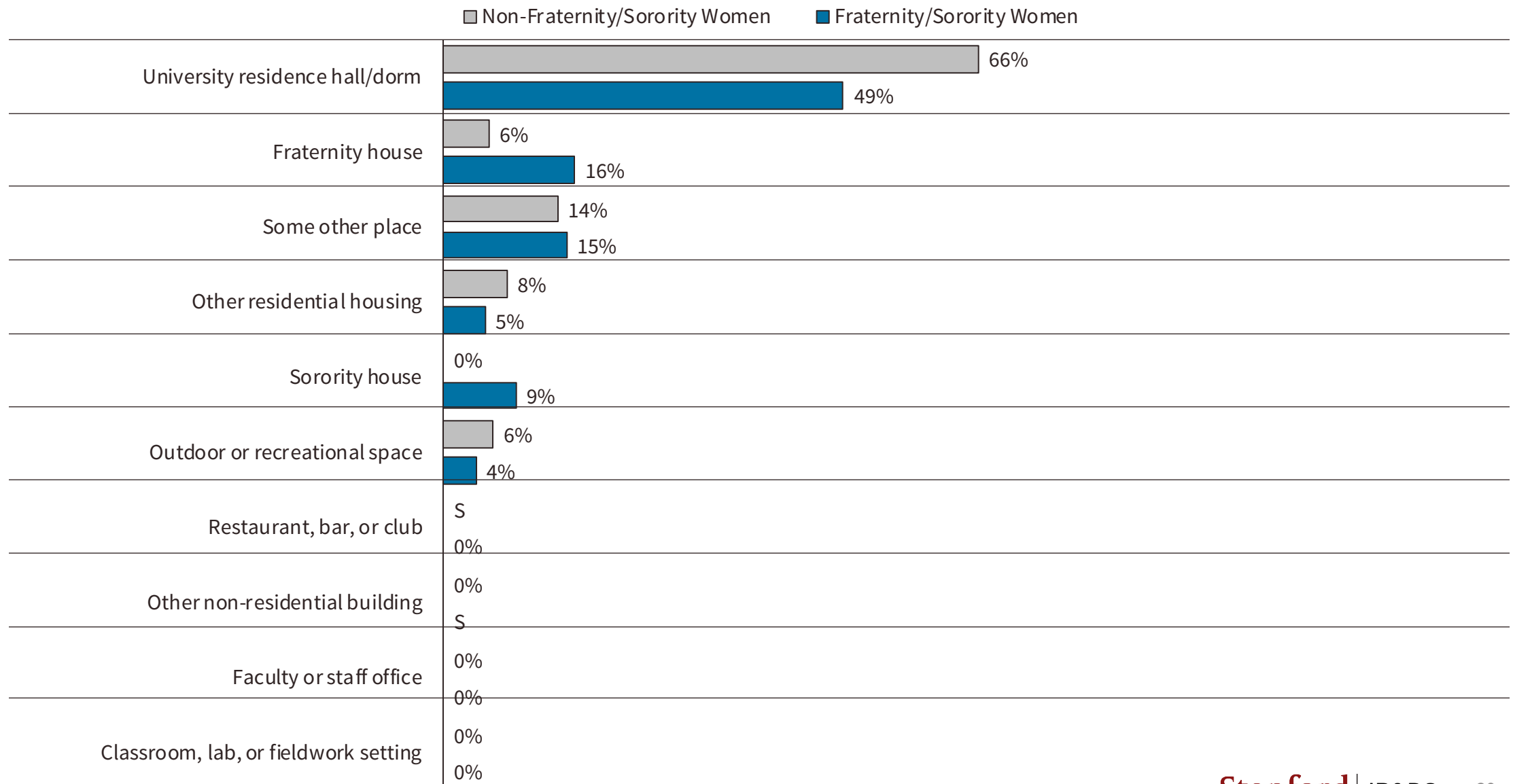
Undergraduate and coterm women by fraternity/sorority organization* membership

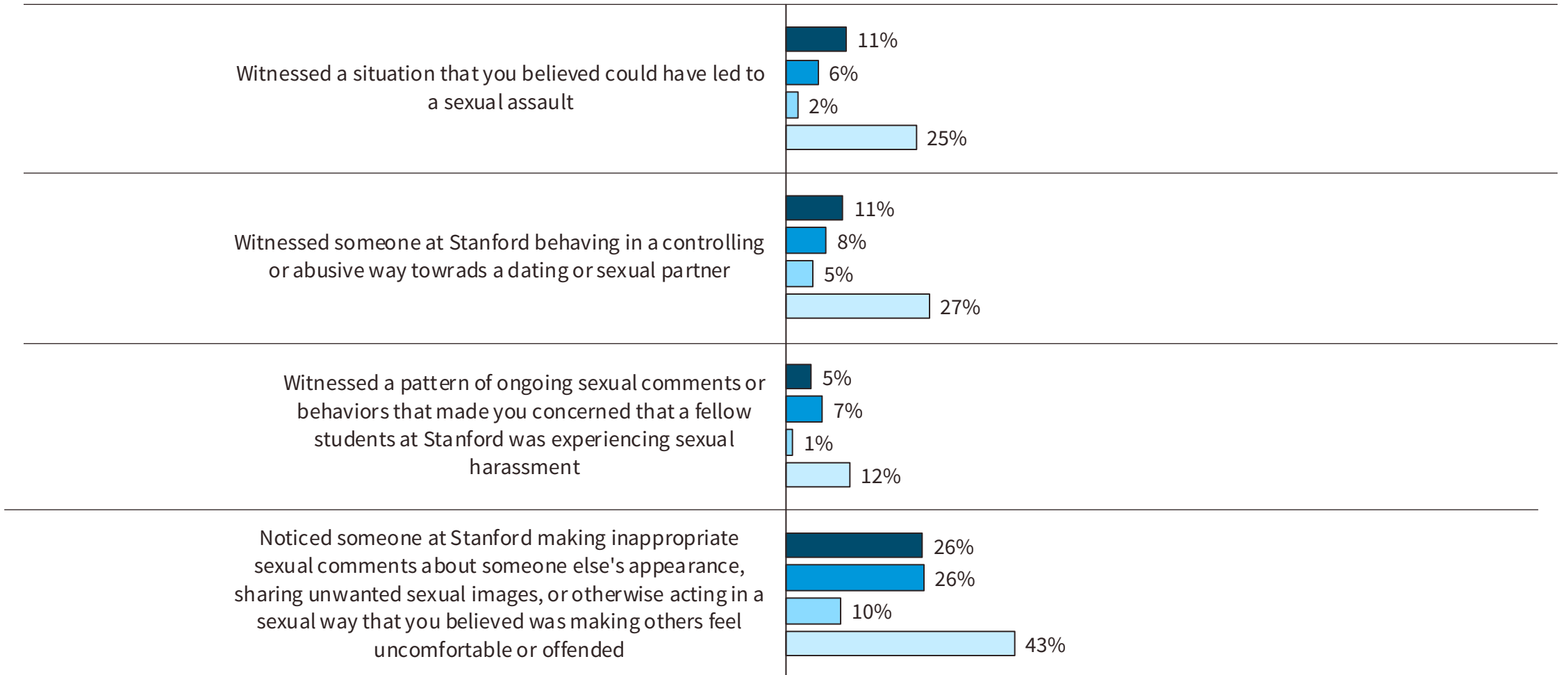

Percent of all Women by degree

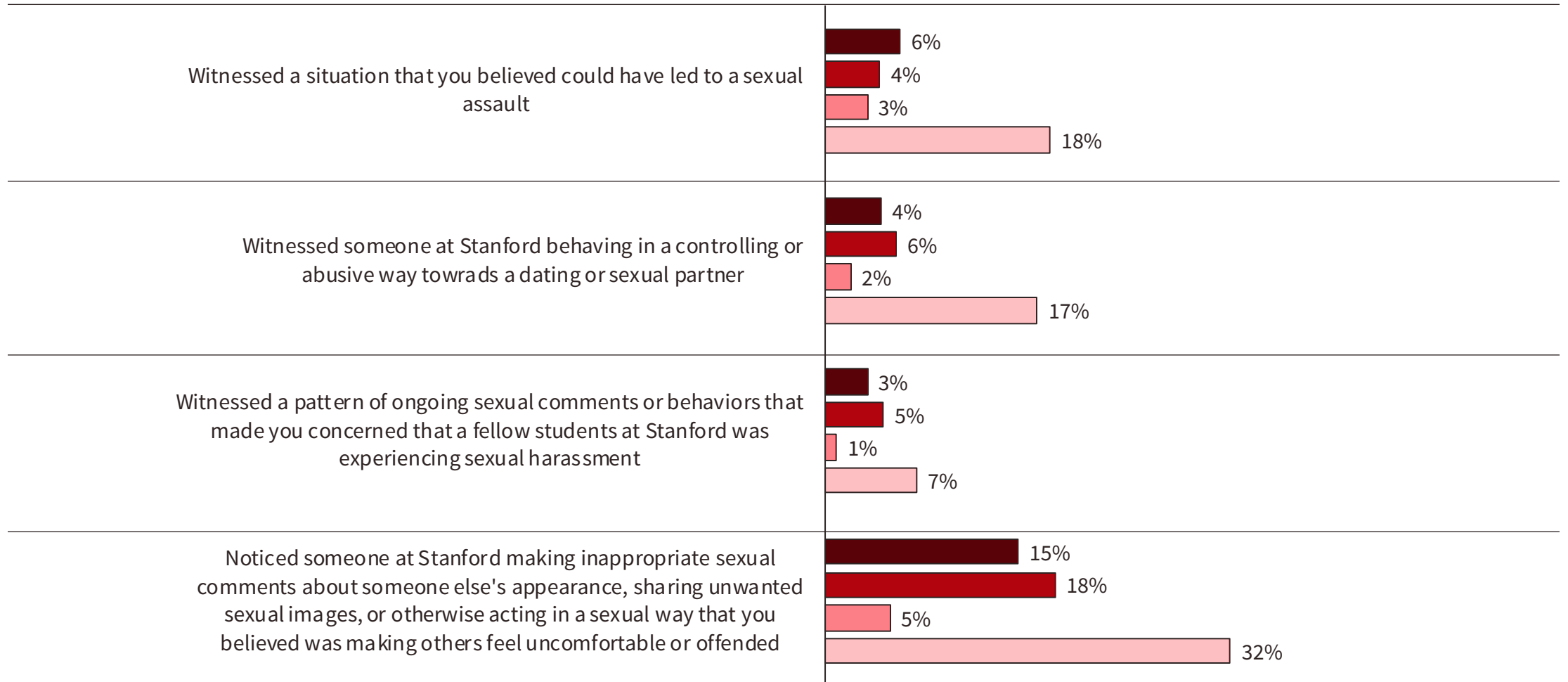

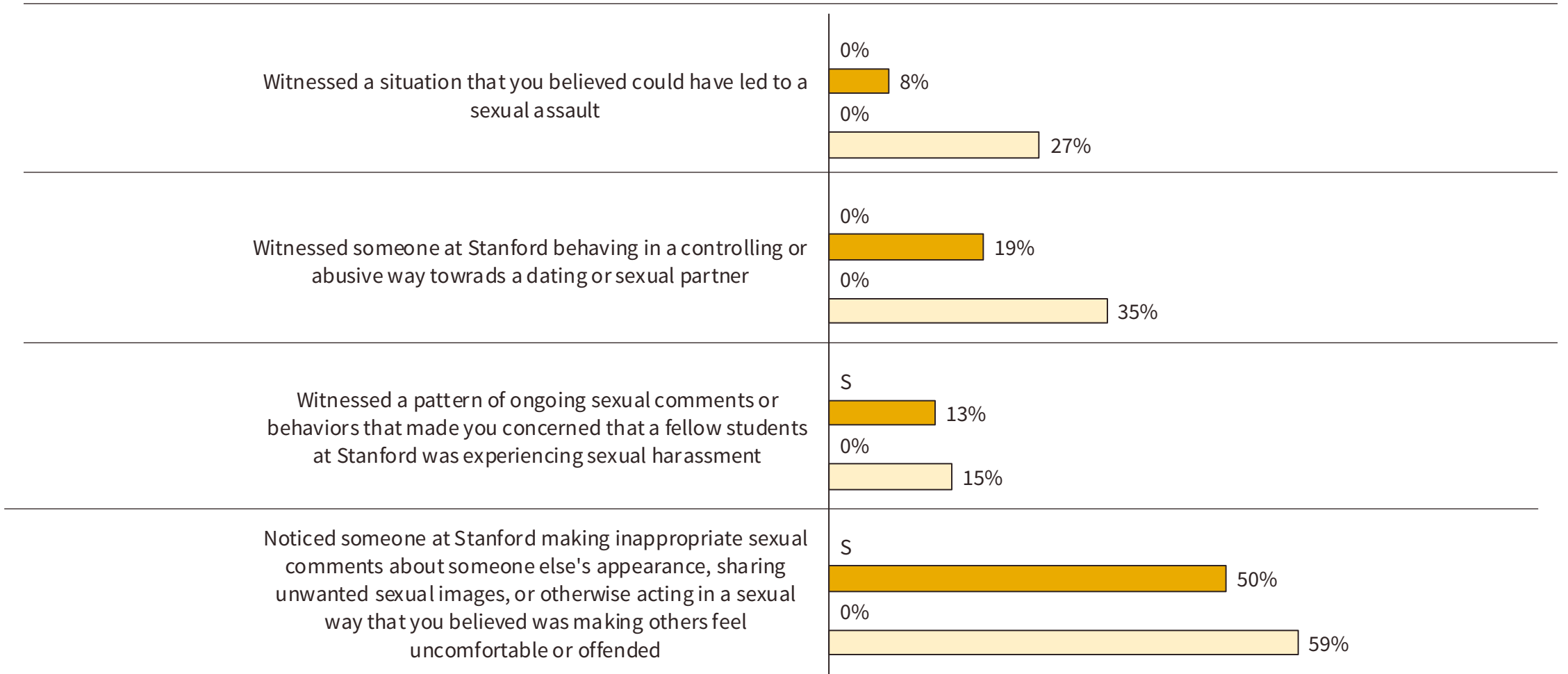

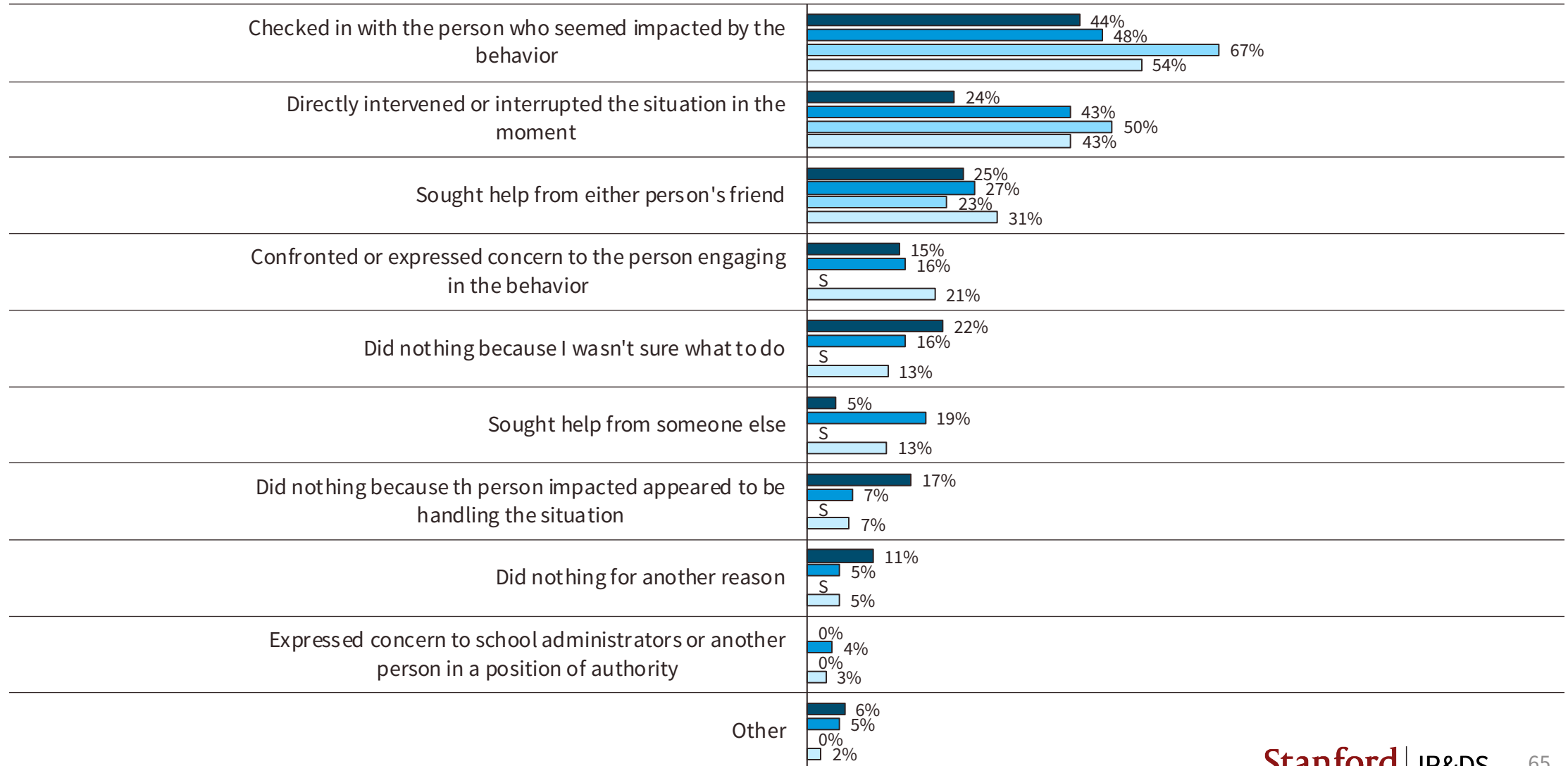

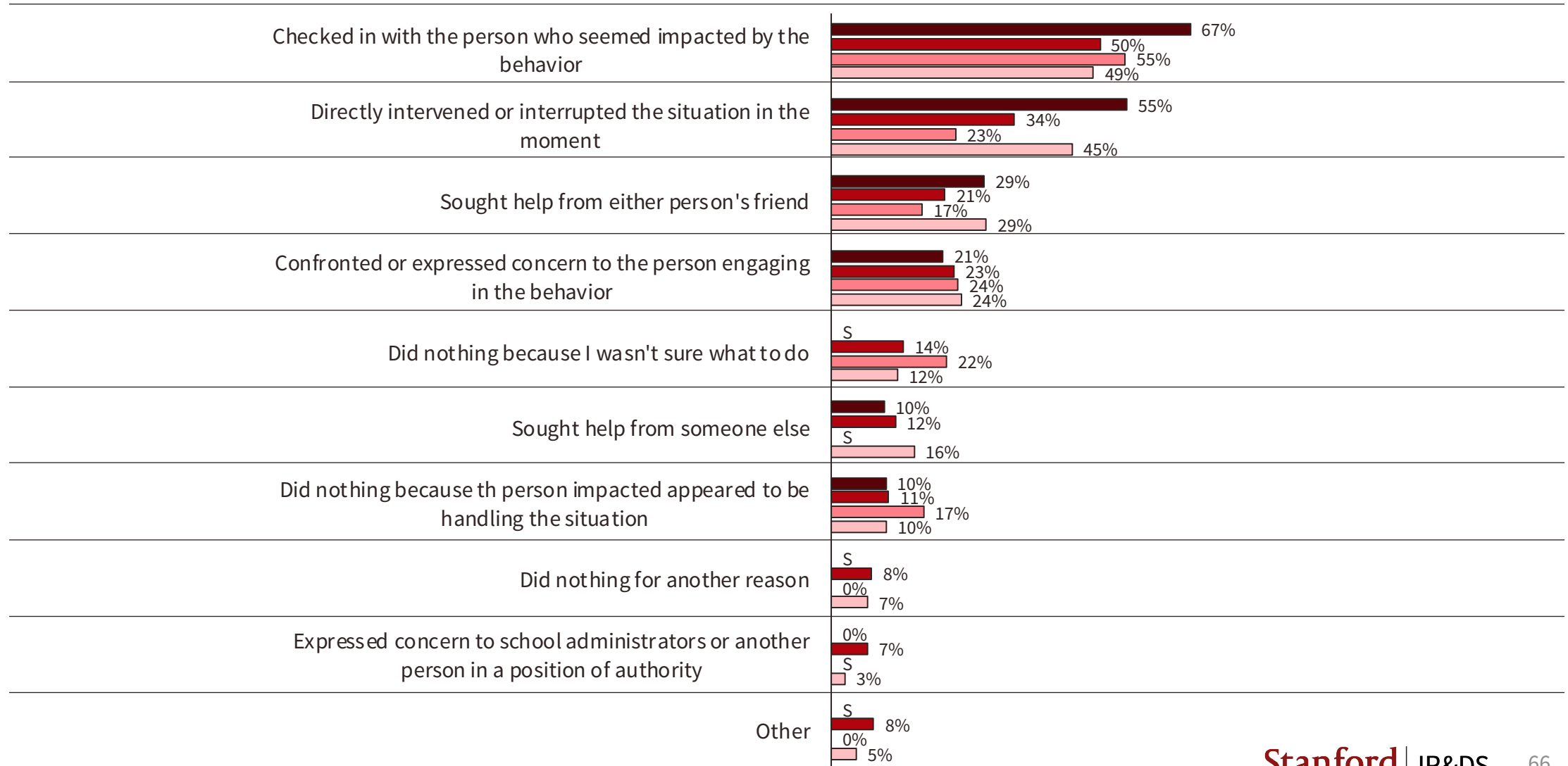

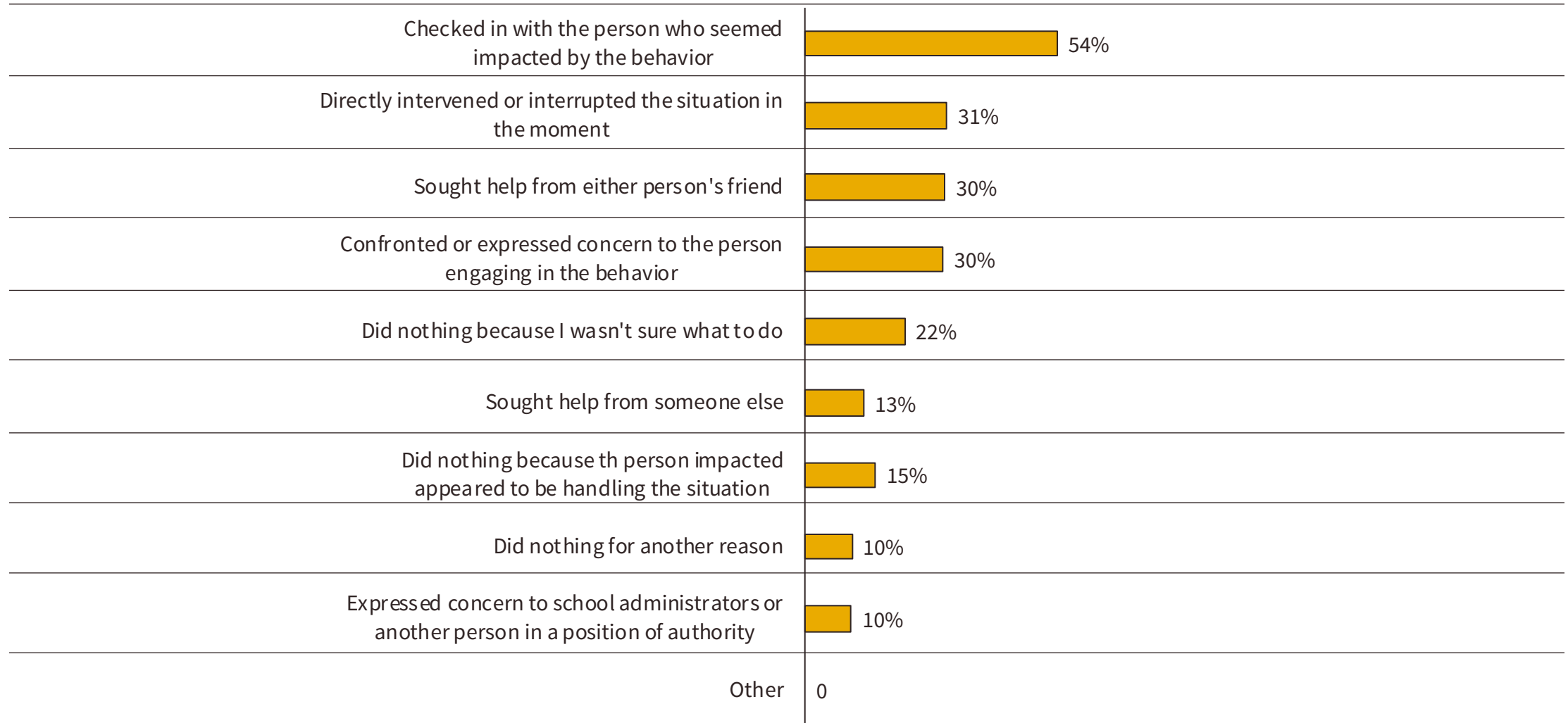

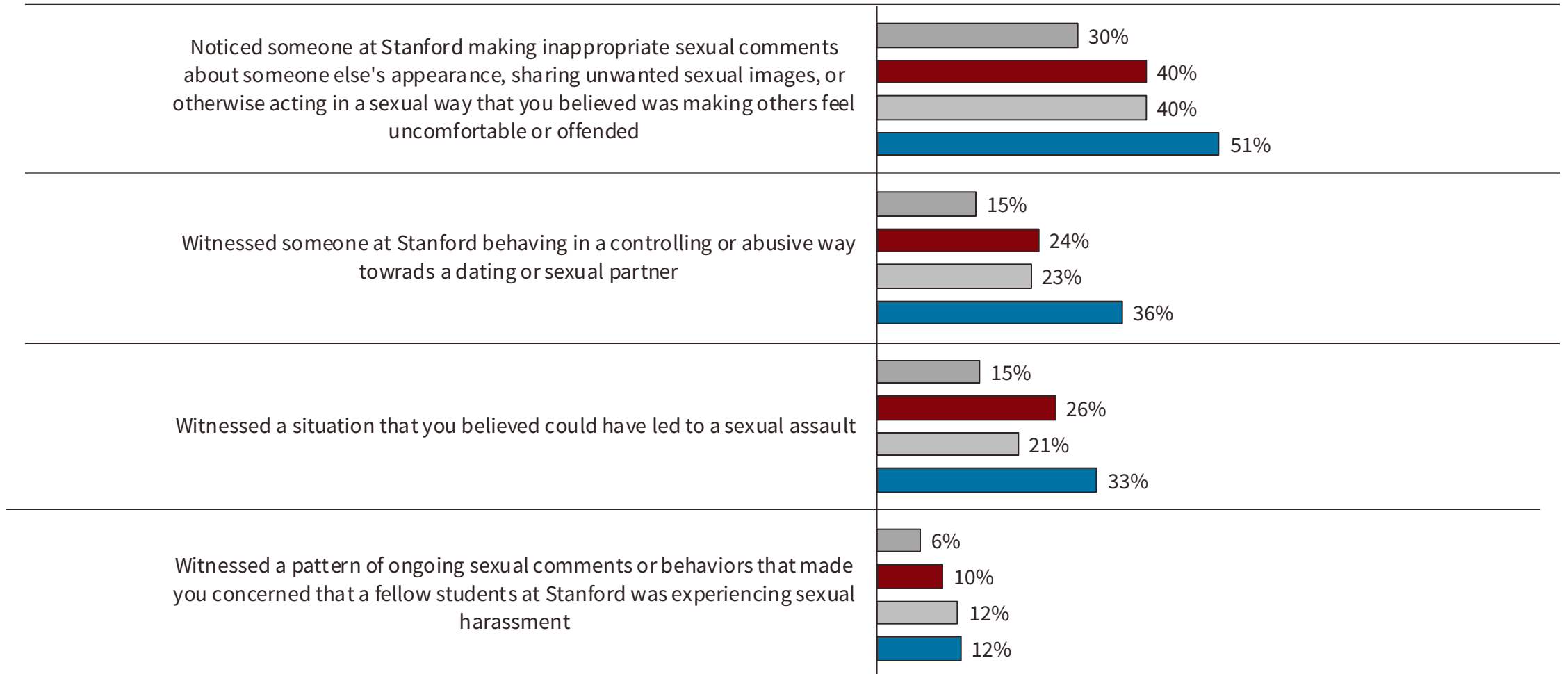

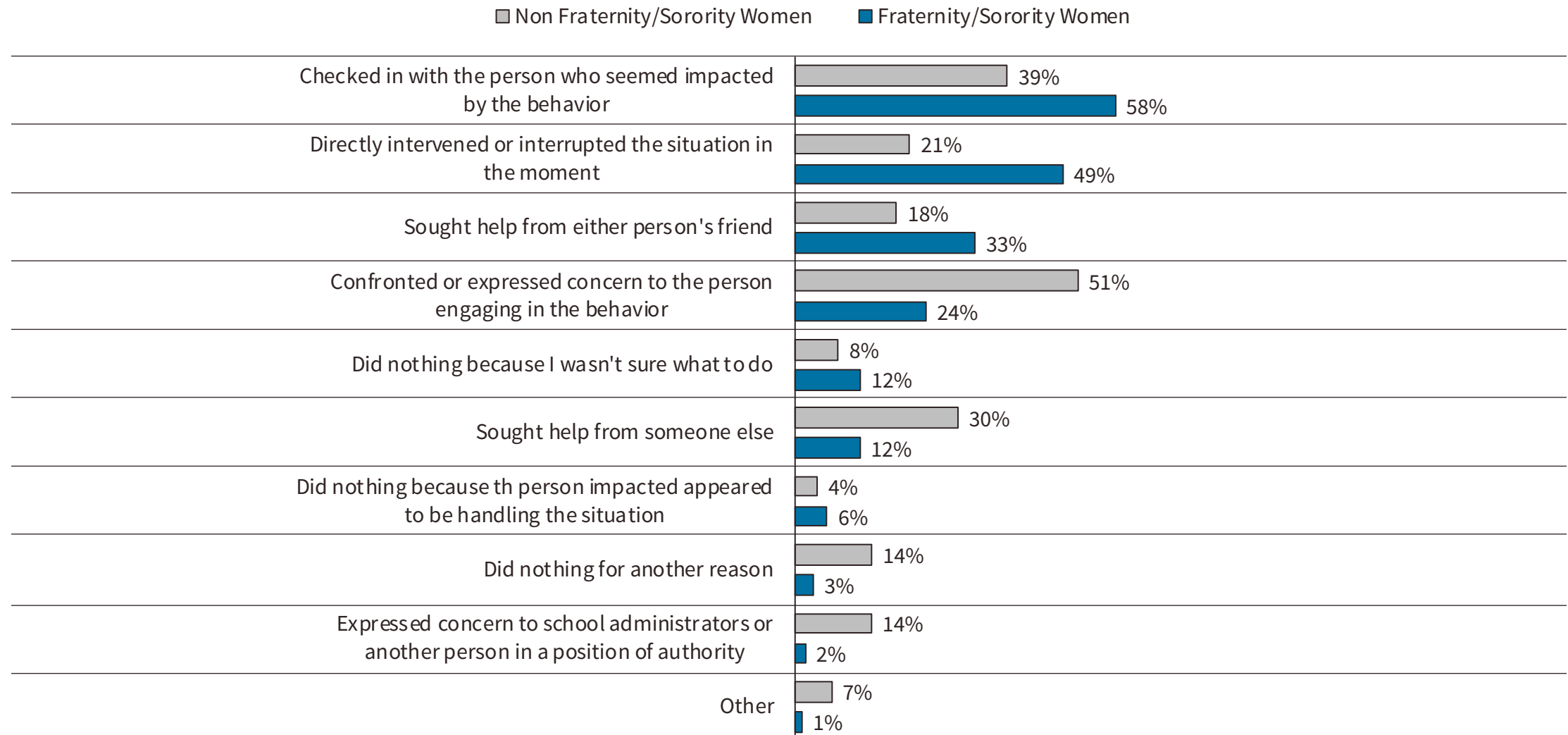

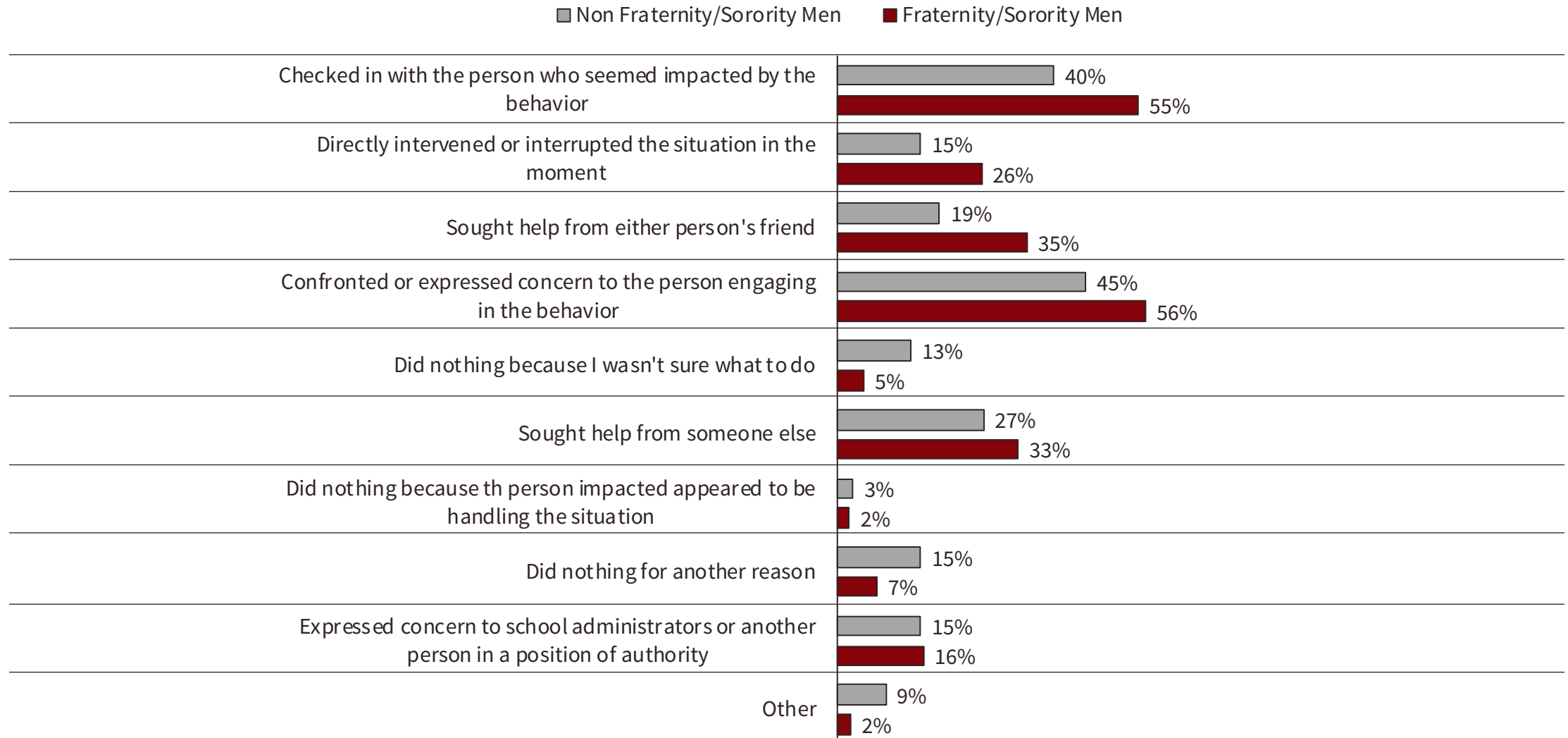
Percent of undergraduate and coterm Women by fraternity/sorority organization* membership
